We have heard, to lament the death in South Africa, of one who should have been in our graduation class today. Mr. Harold L. Borden, son of Hon. Frederick William Borden of Nova Scotia, Minister of Militia and Defence. He was slain on the battlefield while leading his men in deadly conflict with the enemy; and while we mourn his loss, we cannot but admire the courage and the devotion which caused him to sacrifice his brilliant prospects and to lay down his life at the call of his country. Courage and steadfastness were the qualities which chiefly distinguished him; and these have been the qualities inherited in Britons everywhere, which have made the Empire what it is, and which will keep the Empire great and powerful, both in peace and in war while those qualities still remain.

KILLED IN KENTVILLE

Last Monday just about noon Mr. Jerry Mitchell of Bedford, N. S., in the employ of the D. A. R., as brakeman, met his death while coupling cars in the yard in town.

While attempting to couple the passenger car of the freight going east to the baggage car, the track being curved, that bringing on his line of the coupling, the cars closer than usual. He was struck in the pit of the stomach and jammed against the car.

A passenger being near assisted him upon the platform where he said, "he was not hurt."

Shortly after he went to his boarding house and medical aid was called. Upon the arrival of the doctor an examination was held and no bones found broken. He rested well during the afternoon and toward evening internal hemorrhage set in and death occurred at 11 o'clock on Monday evening. His father arrived on the express from Halifax on Monday and after a burial service held by the Rev. C. deW. White, the remains were sent on Tuesday to Bedford for burial.

The deceased was very popular on the road and his death is deeply regretted by his fellow workmen and friends.
