### COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

Mrs. Hartley Will be Up for Murder  
at the Fall Assizes.

### PRISONER LING DISCHARGED

No Criminal Evidence Was Produced  
Against Him—He Turns Queen's  
Evidence and Tells the Story  
of His Relations with  
Mrs. Hartley.

BRANTFORD, Ont., June 29.—The trial  
of Mrs. Maria Hartley and Henry Ling was  
summed up at the police court yesterday.  
Isaac Haight, George Morgan and James  
Peterson were in the witness box, but the  
evidence produced was much the same as  
that at the coroner's inquest.

There being no criminal evidence  
against Henry Ling, he was discharged  
with the consent of the crown.

Henry Ling was then put in the witness  
box and testified that he had never seen  
Mrs. Hartley until he was arrested on the  
day Caleb Hartley went to Hamilton.  
Mrs. Hartley, who had been arrested  
and given Caleb a big dose of Douch on  
the 13th of June, intended to do so  
on the 14th of June, but she was arrested  
before she could do so.

She wanted the insurance and was going  
to have it. Ling refused to keep the secret,  
and told Mrs. Hartley that if he had known  
that she never would have worked there,  
she would have been arrested before she  
could get into the house.

She had been giving him, Caleb Hartley,  
the poison along with the same as she  
gave him. Mrs. Hartley told Ling she  
had given him a big dose of the poison  
before she was arrested when he was  
Hamilton alive. Mrs. Hartley put Caleb  
Kingsnorth out to watch that Elizabeth  
Hartley did not come when he was  
in the room with her. This closed the  
examination.

Ling's counsel for Ling, went into  
the room where the crown witnesses  
were and was ejected by a policeman.  
Mrs. Hartley went into the witness box  
and tried to induce Ling to refuse to  
give evidence, but without avail.

The police magistrate committed Mrs.  
Hartley for trial at the fall assizes on the  
charge of murder.

### FIGURED IN THE REBELLION.

Captain Joseph Lee, a Man With a Career,  
Dies at Windsor.

WINDSOR, June 30.—Captain Joseph  
Lee, one of Windsor's oldest and most re-  
spected citizens, died from the effects of  
a stroke of apoplexy at his residence here  
yesterday morning.

During the rebellion of 1837 he was on  
duty at Amherstburg and other points  
along the Detroit river, and later on was  
in command of the military at Kingston.  
He was also in charge of the forces when  
Yon Siskit, one of the leaders of the re-  
bellion, was hanged. While chief clerk  
in the quarter-master general's office at  
Montreal he was accused of being con-  
nected with the conspiracy to burn the  
Parliament Buildings and was forced to  
retire from the service.

Some years later it was shown that he  
had been unjustly accused, and he was  
given a civil service position in the  
Customs Department.

After quitting the military service Cap-  
tain Lee turned his attention to theoreti-  
cal studies, and for five years travelled with  
E. A. Southern, Mary Gannon, Charles  
Fisher and other noted players of that  
time.

### Trade in the Provinces.

TORONTO, June 30.—Trade in the Pro-  
vince of Ontario has been quiet, owing to  
the election on Tuesday. There is no  
feature in the trade situation in Nova  
Scotia beyond favorable crop prospects.  
Demand in staple lines in the Province of  
Quebec continues meagre. Exports are  
restricted, and buyers generally show  
hesitation. Only here are 800  
business failures in the Dominion of  
Canada and Newfoundland reported. (Ino  
January 1894.)

The increase in total liabilities in  
the first half of this year is \$9,500,000  
more than in the corresponding period of  
1893. Increases in number of failures and  
liabilities are more conspicuous in returns  
from Quebec and Ontario.
