WORD COMES FROM LONDON THAT CANADIAN CATTLE HAVE BEEN PLACED ON THE SAME FOOTING AS ANIMALS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

OTTAWA, June 28.—In the House Mr. Mulock once more brought to the attention of Parliament the question of freight charges upon cattle from the part of Ontario and the necessity for legislation to remedy this evil.

It is impossible for his bill being again reached this session, since the Government had taken all the days of the week for its own business. He went on to say that there was a combination among vessel owners to keep up rates, and this combination had the effect of injuring not only cattle buyers, but the farmers of the country. If the manufacturing industry was injured in this way, the Government would not have hesitated to grapple with the grievance. The cattle trade was equally as important.

Sir Charles Ribblesdale pointed out that there was any proof of a combination, but he pointed out that the Government bills of an important character were cleared from the order paper, and a few hours were spent on this business.
