A MISSING ADVERB

British Home Secretary Tells Why Certain Alterations Were Made in the

Book of Common Prayer. The British Home Sccretary has issued his printed answer to the question put by Mr. Charles McArthur, M.P., the other day, says The Daily Graphic. Mr. McArthur asked him whether he was aware that in a reent addition of the Book of Comnon Prayer, the King's printers had ade certain alterations from the inthorized text, and would he state whose authority they were made. Mr. Akers-Douglas' reply read as oflows: 'I understand that the points referred to in the question of the honorable member are the omission of the word 'well' in the offertory sentence for with such sacrifices God is well pleased, and the omis-sion of a comma after 'grace' in the sentence 'outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritaal grace given unto us, in the Catechism. The following are the facts of the case: By the act of uniformity of 1662 it is rovided that all ministers shall be ound to say and use the public and ommon prayer in such order and W. P. SMITH - Barrister, Solicitor, form as is mentioned in the said book annexed and joined to the present act! It appears that in the 'annexed book' the sentence taken from the thirteenth chapter of the Epistle to the Hebrews runs for with such sacrifices God is pleased.' The 'annexed book' having been carefully collated in 1894 by the King's Printers, in consultation with the printers of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, the error in earlier tions of the Prayer Book was corrected. With regard to the omission of the comma after the word 'grace, in the passage in the Catechism, it is to be observed that, though the com ma appeals in the 'annexed book, the punctuation of that book is throughout of such a peculiar description that it would, if exactly reproduced in modern type, be inconvenient and confusing. As a matter of fact, the punctuation of different editions of printed Prayer Books has varied considerably, and in this particular case the printers at their consultation found that the practice was by no means uniform. In many editions, going back to early dates, the comma was omitted, in others it was printed. Having in view the great importance of uniformity in such a matter, the printers agreed that the comma should be omitted, so that the interpretation of the sentence should not be prejudiced in any direction, it being clear that the system of punctuation in the 'annexed book' is not such as to justify the hasing of an argument on the preor absence of this comma.'

That "Cowy Taste." Milk when first drawn has a pecullar flavor, or "cowy taste," more or ess noticeable, which if not driven off by aeration (exposure to the air) frequently gives the milk an unpleasant taste even before it becomes sour. Aeration may be accomplished by stirring or by pouring from one ves-sel to another. The can of milk may be set in a tub of water to cool The cooling and areation may be better and quicker done by running the milk over a combined cooler aerator or other similar apparatus having provision for running cold water through it. Cleaner cows, cleaner, milkers, scalded utensils, uick and thorough cooling, aeration and less exposure to dust of street when delivering will increase the keeping quality of market milk. properly done, one delivery a day will be all that is necessary .- Dairy

Those who have an abundance of clover hay to mix in with a limited unount of corn fodder, timothy or wild hay and have a few oats to grind with the corn, need not purchase mill feed or linseed meal in rder to feed a balanced ration; but whence there are neither oats not clover hay, it becomes absolutely ne cessary to purchase either tran, lin seed meal or cottonseed meal to furnish the bone and mus le material The most careless feeders have learned that cows fed exclusively on corn corn fodder and timothy hay soo: take on an unthrifty appearance and frequently become feverish and affice, ed with garget, and, even though soon after freshening, commerce to shrink in milk flow. This is due to feeding an excess of fat-producing food without giving the nece sar, protein elements. The cow canne give milk unless she receives mil. material. If she fails to receive a the elements necessary for making milk, she curtails her production to conform to the element wi ich she re ceives the least of, just as a maso in building a wall may have a abundance of stone and sand, but i he is short of lime, the length of hi wall must conform to his supply

Our agricultural chemists have erent much time analyzing our var ious feed stuffs during the pasfifteen years, and the experiment sta ions have tested the principal food products. and have found in nearly very case that the findings of the chemists conform with the results as obtained in the feeding yards. Hence it'should be a part of every farmer's education to know how to make the tert combination of the foods which he has at hand, in order to obtain the best results in the cow barn or the feeding pen.

Ventilating Stables.

The effect of several horses being shut up in the same unventilated stable is to completely poison the air, yet even in the present day, particularly in agricultural districts there are too many who carefully close every aperture by which breath of fresh air can gain admis sion. The result is, with the breathing of every animal the contaminated air passes again and again through the lungs. The blood cannot undergo its profer and healthy change, digestion will not be so perfectly per formed, the nervous system will suffer, and all the functions of life be more or less impaired and, under such conditions, one need not be sur prised at finding sore throat, inflamed lungs, diseased eyes, etc., making

their appearance. Another source of impurity to the air in stables is the presence of deleterious gases resulting from the decomposition of the excretions of the animal and vegetable substances. The principal gases invol ed are the comhydrogen and ammonia, all more or less injurious to the health. When person just enters an ill-ventilated stable in the morning he is annoyed not only by the heat of the confined air, but by a pungent smell recembl-ing hartshorn. The urine contains exceedingly large quantities of compounds easily converted by de omposition into ammonia. Influenced by the heat of a crowded stable and possibly by other decompositions that are going forward at the same time this ammoniacal vapor begins to be given out rapidly almost immediately after the urine is voided. When isease makes its appearance in these badle ventilated stables, is it strange that it spreads with alarming rapidity? When influenta appears in the pring time or in the fall, it is in very

many cases due to this cause. Cornem's Advice to a Farmer. A new and curious light is thrown n the past marter of amusement, P. . Barnum, in a recent magazine artcle. Around his successive homes at Bridgeport, Connecticut, he was fond f putting something that suggested The Greatest Show on Earth, ifferent times he had browsing in his elds, free'y exhibited to the public eve, queerly marked cattle, the sacred tow or an elephant. The Poultry House Floor. Poultry houses should be well filled with sandy soil or gravel, so as to he a foot higher than the surround-ing ground. This is to keep the house dry and prevent diseases that result from the fowls running on damp ground. A good cement floor is better, but many farmers will not have them on account of the cost. Wooden floors are all right, but should be high enough for the wind pass freely under. Any floor that will remain dry fills the bill completely, but the hard floors are more easily kept clean, and cleanliness is the keynote of success.
