A FAR DIFFERENT STORY.

The Associated Press has obtained he following foreign office statement which is authorized by Count V. Buelow, the Imperial Charcellow Neither Great Britain, France nor Russia ever approached Germany to aprticipate in any action aiming at ending the South African war. Germany has all along distinguished between offering her good offices and in-tervention. To render her good offices would be possible under certain cir-cumstances ,viz.:—"If both parties to the war should request it; but it will be remembered that Great Britain joined The Hague conference only on condition that the Boer states wer excluded. There is no doubt that Mr Kruger, who is a serious statesman came to Europe to obtain the good ofices of several of the powers to end war; but there is also no doubt that Great Britain does not want their good offices. At least it is true that since the South African war be gan Great Britain has never either verbally or in writing, confidentially or officially, broached such an idea. It isq uite possible that the Boer side has now formally asked The Hague court has held a session regarding the matter; but that, of course, is entirely different from any serious steps

It was no Freeze-out Firing on the Str. Erie During her Big Race.

Chathamite who Went Through the Ordeal Talks of the Struggle-Pins his Faith to the Erie in Another Race

"It was the fastest ride that I ever had. We got over a distance of about one hundred miles and during that time we shovelled one bundred

tons of coal." These words were addressed to a Planet representative this morning by John Houston, who acted as a fireman on the steamer Erie when she defeated the steamer Tashmoo in the

race held a few days ago. Fast living, however, evidently does not agree with Mr. Houston as he has been forced to come home to recuperate his strength, having been completely overcome with the heat which issued from the furnaces during the race. Mr. Houston is well known in the city, being a son of Nate Houston, of the eleventh concession, Harwich. He sailed, as a fireman, during the whole of last season on the steamer Erie, which plies between Pennsylvania and Buffalo, and returned this spring to resume his duties for the present sea-

When the race was arranged between the Erie and the Tashmoo, which plies between Port Huron and Detroit, Mr. Houston, who has the record for being one of the best fire-men on the lakes, was chosen to act on this occasion. For two weeks be-fore the race the crew on the Eric worked very hard to get rounded into shape and everything was in first class condition when the eventful day

In all sixteen firemen were engag-ed on the Erie. Twelve of these were to put her through the race and the other four were to fire for the return

"The heat coming from those furnaces was something terrific," said Mr. Houston. "Well!" he added, "it was so hot that a couple of the firemen were overcome before the race was nearly completed and two of the extra firemen had to take their places. "Just to show you how much delay every little accident like that causes

on such an occasion," continued he, "I can tell you that we lost over ten pounds of steam before the two firemen could get below to relieve those who had become exhausted."

Mr. Houston is at present in a very bad condition, and it will be some time before he recovers his former health. He will remain at home during the rest of the summer but will.

ing the rest of the summer but will again take his place on the Erie next fall.

It is expected that the Erie and the Tashmoo will have another race this fall. Mr. Houston hopes to have sufficiently recovered by that time to again take part in the struggle. This energetic young fireman, like every other true sailor, is proud of his boat, and expresses it as his opinion that the Erie will experience no difficulty in again defeating the Tashmoo in the race next fall.
