### AN OPPONENT'S TRIBUTE.

Rev. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Toronto Globe, who is in Winnipeg for the purpose of delivering a lec ture, was interviewed by the Winnipeg Telegram. During the course of his remarks he said:

"I deem it in the interests of Canada that a man of Mr. Borden's personal character, as well as of his po litical ability, should be influential in the councils of the country."

"It is the hope of very many prominent Liberals in Ontario that Mr. Borden will be given a seat, while personally, I naturally do not think he mastered all the details of the transportation question, still during the few years that he has been leader of the Conservative party, he has won, and I say it with all sincerity, the respect and admiration of each and every Liberal who came to know him, and what is more his party had utmost confidence in him. I myself think very highly of Mr. Borden, and I don't know any man in the party ranks who is so well able to act as leader in the interests of the country as he is himself."

The above constitutes a very handsome tribute and what is more it is thoroughly deserved.

### A SUGGESTION FOR MR. ROSS.

### STRAY SHOT

It Killed Young Deering while Hunt ing-Has many Relatives in this District

Detroit, Nov. 15.—The body of Frank A. Deering, the only son of Anson C. Deering, of the Deering Water Tube Boiler Co., who was shot dead in the Roscommon County woods Sunday afternoon, while hunting with his father, came into Detroit over the Michigan Central, shortly after eight o'clock Tuesday morning. A number of friends of the family, including Eugene Siegel of the American Lady Corset Co., John F. and Horace E. Dodge of Dodge Bros., and a dozen others gathered at the depot. Mr. Deering himself did not come on the train as far as the depot, but left at Fourteenth avenue, where his family met him. This is near his home.

The friends at the depot learned with relief that the post mortem examination has somewhat softened the terrible blow. When the father, who stood six rods away from the boy, saw him fall, he thought it was his own bullet that had wounded his son. home. He was nearly crazed at this terrible thought. But there was no doubt left, after investigation, that this was

The fatal bullet was of a different pattern from those the Deerings used and was evidently a spent ball, as after entering the young man's body from behind, under the left arm, it shattered a rib, passed through the body, and stopped in the sweater in front, in front, wintout piercing that garment. The bullet, to be stopped thus easily, must have been traveling for more than a mile, according to a coroner's jury of the residents in the hunting districts. The jury's verdict declared that the young man came to his death from a bullet fired by an unknown person, and that "there is no shadow of possibility that the bullet was discharged from the weapon held by A. C. Deering. As Mr. Deering's distance from his son, with the powerful gun he held, the bullet would have gone through is ix men, theresidents declared. A pine log 16 inches in thickness would be easily pierced.

The body was received at the depot by V. Giest & Son, who started for the family home on Fifteenth street, The friends who came to the depot went to the house for a few minut-

The friends who came to the depot went to the house for a few minut-es to offer sympathy to the stricken father and mother, and the other relatives. Little could be said the friends could only look in, perhaps shake hands, and leave the family to receive their boy alone.

No arrangements for the funeral

have been made as yet.

The deceased young man is the son of the daughter of the late Salem Traxler, of thiscity, and has many relatives in Chatham township. The funeral will take place to-morrow
