PROPOSED LEGISLATION

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—Parliament was spened by his Excellency the Govern-General yesterday afternoon with all the time-honored pomp and circumstance. The day was dull, windy and raint, but inside the Commons and Senate Chamber all was bright and festive. The speech from the throne was as follows:—

Unparalleled Prosperity.

Mon. Gentlemen of the Senate:
Gentlemen of the House of Commons:
In opening the third session of the tenth Parliament of Canada, I avail myself of the opportunity to offer you my congratulations on the unparalleled prosperity prevailing in all parts of the Dominion. The harvest has been abundant, and the trade with both British and foreign nations continues to expand in annually increasing volume, with every prospect of continued growth for many years to come.

The number of immigrants seeking homes in Canada continues yearly to increase, and it is very satisfactory to observe the larger proportion that in any former year has in the past season come from the British Isles.

During the recess following the last session I visited the Western provinces and was much gratified to note the great advance that is being made in the development of the vast resources of those highly favored sections of the Dominion. I found the people of the West rejoicing in their prosperity and full of hope and confidence in the future growth of its agricultural and industrial wealth.

The quinquennial census recently taken in the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan shows that those provinces are now entitled to an increase in their representation in the House of Commons. A bill giving effect to that provision will be submitted for your approval. In accordance with the announcement made in a previous session you will be asked to consider a bill for the revision of the Customs tariff.

The sanction of Parliament will be required to give legal effect to the treaty made with the Empire of Japan. A bill for that purpose will be submitted for your approval.

The products and manufactures of Canada shown at the recent international exhibition held in the City of Milan proved a great attraction, and as a result, it is confidently believed our trade with Central and Southern Europe can be materially increased.

The naval authorities having relinguished the use of the dockyard at Halifax, a proposal was made to transfer it to the Government of Canada. This offer has been accepted, and the dockyard will now be used by the Department of Marine and Fisheries as a base for its operations in connection with aids to navigation.

Many immigrants having in recent years been induced to come to Canada by false representations made in the United Kingdom, at the request of the Minister of Labor, a clause has been added to the Merchants' Shipping Bill mow before the Imperial Parliament, for the punishment of any persons who may be found guilty of that offence.

The late Senator was the son of the late Francis William Kerr, a native of Fermanagh, Ireland, who settled in Ameliasburg, Prince Edward County, Ont. Born in Ameliasburg, 1829, he received his early education at Newtonville, under the Rev. Dr. Ormiston (Presbyterian). Afterwards entering Victoria University, Cobourg, obtaining the degree of B.A. in 1855, M.A. in 1855, and L.D. in 1887. His legal studies were carried on in the office of Smith & Armour, Cobourg, the last named being the late chief justice of Ontario. He was called to the Bar in 1859, and practiced throughout in the Town of Cobourg. In 1867 he was elected mayor of Cobourg, holding that office continuously and always by acclamation until 1873. A Liberal in politics, he represented West Northumberland in the House of Commons from the general election, 1874, to the general election, 1878. Mr. Kerr was an unsuccessful candidate for the same riding in 1878, 1882 and 1885. In 1897 he was raised to the Senate, succeeding Sir Oliver Mowat.

He was a member of the Methodist Church ad he married Myrs, third daughter of the late John Field, Cobourg. Four sons and three daughter's survive. The tuneral will take place at Cobourg on Sunday.

Two other vessels, the St. Louis, owned by Sylvester Bros. of Toronto, and the barge Locke, also of Haney & Miller's fleet, were anchored close to the Resolute, but their crews could offer no assistance as they were in grave danger themselves. They both weathered through the night, the crews being brought ashore by the island surf boat crew early yesterday morning. They are both in great danger of foundering, as the anchorage is none too secure.

None of the bodies have been recovered.
