WAITED ON GOVERNMENT

Delegation From Kent Ask for Assistance in Drainage Schemes

Were Given very Encouragement and it is Expected Grant Will be Made Good Work of H. S. Clements

On Monday a deputation consistng of H. S. Clements, M. P., J. M. Pike, Reeve Pardo and Councillor James Wellwood, of Raleigh, waited upon Premier J. P. Whitney and members of his Cabinet, asking for Government spitters. Fovernment as istance in the matter of repairing the Dauphin and Pike

The general representations were made by Mr. Clements, who has worked persistently during the past year to get assistance for those so much in need of it, on the two impaired drainage schemes.

It was shown to the Government that a vast amount of money had been spent on the two schemes for diking and reclaiming, and attention was drawn to the amount of taxes paid and the revenue added, which made it *mpossible for the residents adjacent to the schemes, to spend the amount required, to rectify the damage done to the embankments and the pumping system by the destructive flood of 1904.

Although the Government, on general principles, have, been inclined to turn down the numerous requests for aid on drainage schemes, the deputation were successful in obtaining the assurance that the Government.

WILL FEED **OUT FIRE**

Warden Sturgis say County Council will Fight C. 1. Board

County Will Stand all Chanese of Appeal on Judge Bell's Decision

The continuation of the reference of the dispute existing between the County and the Collegiate Institute Poard, relative to the maintenance of county pupils at the school, was held before Judge Bell in Harrison Hall this morning.

The Judge has already decided up on one point, viz., that the County may pay only 80 per cent. of the maintenance of such pupils, and the argument is now being held re the adjustment of accounts. It was adjourned until next Monday.

In conversation with a Planet reporter this morning, Warden Sturgis, who, with County Commissioner Grant, attended the argument this norning, had the following to say in reference to the proposed appeal on Judge Bell's decision in reference to the 80 per cent.

"Will the County pay 100 per cent of the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute? Oh, certainly not. We will pay what

Oh, certainly not. We will pay what we are forced to pay by law-80 per cent.—and nothing more.

"So the Collegiate Institute Board is thinking of excluding County pupils from the Collegiate Institute. Well, if they do they will lose the Government grant and the County grant, and we will spend our money with the other schools through the County who are taking up constinuation work. We have always been willing to pay our fair share for the maintenance of our pupils at the C. C. I. and we shall always continue to do so.

to do so.
"Probably the Collegiate Institute Board forget that the County has money invested in the school building. If they exclude our pupils they will have to buy out our interests in the school.

"No, we will not compromise the matter. We are now naying our fair share and if the Collegiate Board appeal Judge bell's decision, we will fight it.

"There are a number of fire-eaters on the Board and if fire-eating agrees with them we will see that they keep on eating it."
