The doctor limited his remarks to the broad subject of the love of one's country and the demonstrative pride which every person in Canada should feel, in being citizens of this enlightened and progressive land of freedom. The doctor thought that the subject of patriotism should find a more important place among the studies of the children of the Public schools.

Dr. Battisby's remarks were in deed along a commendable line, and they will no doubt strike a responsive chord in the minds of all true Can tdians. The people of Canada are proud of their country, but it is sometimes thought that they do not exert themselves in demonstrating this pride. In the country to the this pride. In the country to the south there is more of this show of enthusiasm, and there is no doubt, that it plays a great part in the promotion of patriotism in the tender mirds of the young, and in thus encouraging unity and strength among the many slasses of people. This is all wrong. Dominion Day should be observed in Canada with the biggest celebration the people are capable of preparing. American Fourth of July celebration should not be in it for one minute, for Canada has more cause for enthusiasm and rejoicing.

Like mission work, all reforms should be inaugurated at home. Chathamites should be loyal to Chatham, and they should take a pleasure in exhibiting this loyalty in such a pronounced manner that others would see it and be attracted by it.

There are numerous ways in which a man can be loyal to his town. One of the most important ways of showing it is by accepting and performing the duty he owes to true citizenship. Just at this season of the year, as the time approaches, when a new civic Board will have to be chosen to manage the affairs of the city during the coming year, there is great need for a display of local patriotism. It is important that the City Council shall be composed of the best men that the city can produce. The people are at present waiting for these men to get in the field. Chatham has strong capable men who are worthy of a voice in the government of any city, and there should be no hesitation on the part of these men to accept the call when it is made.

One of the greatest factors in the furtherence of local patriotism is a strong and universal belief in the future of the town. This should not a difficult problem in Chatham. Everyone in the Maple City has visions of great possibilities being accomplished in the future. This is all very well and good, but people that they hav should show courage of their convictions. Having once become thoroughly convinced, they should follow it up with suitable action.

Every year thousands of dollars are spent by Chathamites in outside speculations. What this money would mean to local industry, no one has sufficient imagination to estimate. In many of these speculations the propositions presented are bo no means s good as opportunities which are allowed to go begging right here in Chatham. If Chatham is to develop, the people here must do the work. Canada for Canadians is a popular and commendable cry, and it can be converted, with equal importance and significance into a unanimous shout of "Chatham for Chathamites."
