"God Bless our Canada."

In the course of his sermon on Thanksgiving Day, Rev. Mr. Carleton, of Charlottetown, speaking of Canada, said: "Considered as we are with the motherland, many of us fail to see that there is growing up here a great nation—in territory 600,000 square miles larger than the United States, in moral worth surpassed by no other nation. I for one have no desire to see the link that binds us to the motherland severed. But I cannot shut my eyes to the fact that in a short time there will be a nation here the equal of any. Higher and higher is she rising, gradually drawing to her the best, the hardiest sons of the old land; her great railroads and steamboats drawing nearer to her than ever the east and the west.

"In the view of this, we should cultivate national sentiment. An enthusiastic love of country is one of the most powerful factors in moulding the destiny of any people. No nation, ancient or modern, has ever attained greatness without it. No land, to the Breton, can excel his own native land. The same may be said of Germany, France and any other country; that national sentiment draws the people closer and closer together."

"The danger that threatens us is sectional pride. Every loyal Canadian must feel that the worst tendency of our national life is that indicated by the setting up of provinces against provinces. It was this that wrought so disastrously with the United States. A solid north and solid south made secession possible, and a bloody war inevitable. In olden times it was a solid Israel and a solid Judah that weakened the nation and made them the prey to surrounding nations. The questions on the Pacific coast, the northwest territories, in Ontario, Quebec and the lower provinces should be the questions with us. It is here and on such occasions as this that true national sentiment can be cultivated. The religion of Christ, uniting as it does all hearts in one—here that spirit is cultivated, when the hour of trial comes, crushes forever all the narrowness of local jealousies and helps every loyal soul to lift up its voice and say, 'God bless our Canada.' Cultivate this sentiment. Draw closer to you the land of your adoption, or the land of your birth. Frown down the man who knows no love of country."

"There are a few things this country can do without, but it has no use for the man, be he whig or tory, who has no good word to say of his country, and is forever praising some other land."

"On the verge of nationhood we stand. Pray God that He may help us love our country and hold her honor ever dear."

Philosophy of a Cold.

Says Professor Woodbury, of the Medical-Chirurgical College of Philadelphia: "If there is anything calculated to take all the brightness out of the sunshine, all the savor out of our food, and all the sweetness out of our life, it is a cold in the head." He presents some thoughts in his philosophy, the substance of which may interest the mighty host of sufferers.

In every case there are two factors, an irritant and a susceptibility of the system. Among the irritants are microscopic germs taken in from without, as in influenza and certain poisons which are developed from bad nutrition or imperfect assimilation within the body, and which it is the office of the liver to destroy. Indeed, the effects of the two causes are essentially the same, for the germs act by generating certain violent poisons, which irritate the mucous membrane of the nostrils, pharynx, lungs, stomach or bowels.

As to susceptibility to colds, a healthy body, under ordinary circumstances, has very little of it. But sudden climatic changes may induce it. Horses, brought from the West, often have a discharge from the nostrils which lasts about six months.

A ship's crew, who had been perfectly healthy while absent several months on the Alaska coast, were all on their return, taken down with a cold in the head.

Of an audience going out into a bleak atmosphere from a close, warm room, a certain portion will take cold. These have the requisite susceptibility; the rest are happily free from it. In all cases of this susceptibility, there is a lowering of the nutrition, a certain depraved or depressed condition. The luxurious and indolent are as liable to it as the poor, and those whose surroundings are bad.

A normal condition of the skin is the chief protection against a cold. Three-fourths of the sufferers from catarrhal pneumonia or chronic bronchitis are found to be in the habit of neglecting the skin. Their skin has become degraded, and is no longer a protective covering for the body.

The skin needs to be hardened by the use of the flesh-trail, the cold douches, the air bath, and by frequent change of underclothing. Active exercise needs to be added, to keep the tissues from sloping. The time to cure the patient is before he gets the cold.

A Greater Country than the United States.

Let us not delude ourselves with fictitious greatness. There is another country at whose greatness we may well pause for contemplation. Its area extends eight and a half million square miles. The basis of its power is not land, but water. Its greatness is maritime, and its coast line is 28,500 miles long. It lies on both sides of the equator, and its boundaries touch the extremes of heat and cold. Its pacificated area, which can be made to feel unborn millions without the help of the United States, covers millions of square miles. It contains 600,000 square miles of forest, which are jealously preserved while ours are being ruthlessly sacrificed. Its population amounts to 35,000,000 souls, including pretty nearly all the races known to man. Its revenue for government amounts to more than a thousand million dollars annually; only one fourth of which is levied in direct taxation. It has nearly a million men under arms. It has one policeman for every sixteen square miles of its entire area. Its 246 war vessels are all in commission, not rotting in harbors. Its merchant navy consists of 30,000 ships manned by 170,000 sailors. Its sea-going tonnage amounts to eight and a half millions. It surpasses in steamers all other powers on the globe, and nearly equals their combined total in sailing vessels. Forty-nine per cent of the carrying power of the world is under that flag. More than half the ships' earnings from freight and passengers belongs to it. Two thirds of the tonnage annually built belongs to it. The banks of that empire transact one-third the business of the entire world. Its manufactures comprise one third of all Europe. It uses 30 per cent of all horse power of the world. Its enormous debt, which it uses as the most profitable investment of its own earnings, amounts to only 5 per cent of its wealth. It is the wealthiest state in the world, and its wealth has been made by exports. Its name is Great Britain.—Chicago Herald.

Temperance and the Gospel.
