Obituaries.

At the Halifax Infirmary on Sun-
day afternoon last occurred the death
of Florence E., beloved wife of Mr
Arthur M. Hoare, of that city. Al-
though ill for some weeks her death,
which followed an operation from
which she never rallied, was a great
shock to her family and friends.

The deceased was a native of Wolf-
ville, being here her marriage. Flo-
rence, the daughter of the late Alex-
ander and Rebecca MacKenzie. She
was a most popular and highly
esteemed lady and was greatly be-
loved by all who had the pleasure of her
acquaintance. Her gentle manner
and kindly disposition endeared her
to old and young alike.

In addition to the sorrowing hus-
band she is survived by a sister, Miss
Sadie Mackenzie, one daughter, Kath-
leen, a member of last year's gradu-
ating class at Acadia Seminary, and
two sons, Gerald and Alex., all of
whom have the sincere sympathy of a
host of Wolfville friends.

The funeral, which took place at 3
o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, was
very largely attended, and the proofs
of sympathy and sorrow were many.
Rev. A. B. Colver, pastor of the First
Baptist church, of which the deceased
was an active and helpful member,
conducted the service, and sweet and
appropriate music was rendered by
the choir. The casket was borne to
its last resting place in Fairview Cem-
etery literally covered with flowers.

The death occurred on Sunday, at
Grand Pre, after a lengthy illness, of
Mrs. Mary Bowser, relict of the late J.
Benson Bowser, an aged and highly
respected member of the community,
of which she had been a resident dur-
ing her long life of 85 years, with the
exception of a few years after her
marriage at Sackville, N. B.

Mrs. Bowser was the last surviving
daughter of the 'Avery' family, she be-
ing a daughter of the late Samuel
Avery, and a niece of the late Dr. J.
F. Avery, of Halifax, the other mem-
bers of the family having passed
away previously. A woman of kindly
disposition, as well as a devoted
Christian, she will be missed in the
neighborhood, as also is the Metho-
dist church at Grand Pre, of which
she was for many years a faithful
member.

She leaves one son, S. Avery Bow-
ser, of Grand Pre.

After an illness of several weeks
the death occurred at his home at St.
Stephen, N. B., on Thursday evening
of last week, of Mr. B. R. DeWolfe, a
respected citizen of that place, and
of this town. Mr. DeWolfe was a sturdy,
upright citizen, whose influence
was always for the betterment of his
community. He was an ardent sup-
porter of temperance, had been a mem-
ber of Union street Baptist church for
many years, and was deeply interest-
ed in Sunday-school work. For some
time he had been in poor health, but
his illness was not considered serious
until about two weeks ago.

Word has been received of the
death at Niaga, Manitoba, of Mrs.
Ruhland, wife of J. W. Ruhland, archi-
tect and builder, formerly of Halifax.
The deceased leaves three daughters
and one son. The daughters are Mrs.
Ingram E. Hill, at whose home she
died; Mrs. Frank Blackadar and Mrs.
Peter Mylins, in the United States.

The son, J. Milton, resides in the
west. The deceased was a lady of
kindly disposition, and a devoted
Christian, and she will be greatly
missed by her husband and family.

Thomas R. Pattillo, who passed
away recently in Halifax, was a grad-
uate from Acadia in the class of '56,
the last to go of his class. The others
were Arthur G. Johnston, Halifax,
and Robert W. Phillip, Halifax. He
was next in rank, the oldest living
graduate of Acadia.

The Gadfly.

In view of the election which has
so recently taken place in Manitoba,
we feel like remarking that while
Manitoba may be the 'postage stamp
province' of the Dominion and may be
the smallest, yet what it lacks in
size it makes up in brains. The mal-
icious, yelping, snarling rascals, who
thought they were acting as
statesmen, worked over hours in at-
tributing all sorts of unworthy mo-
tives to every blessed move the Rob-
lin and Rogers government made for
the advancement and development of
that province, have got their answer.

Public ownership undertaking may be
wise or foolish, but Manitoba seems
to like it and the other provinces will
likely follow suit.

It is to be hoped that those elderly
gentlemen who are enjoying a mili-
tary sun-bath at Halifax for their
health at \$2 per day, will, when they
become instructors of the youth of
our country, have compassion upon
the latter whose pay is so small. It is
said that already one of these elderly
scientific, military health seekers has
been able to lay before the war office
particulars of a wonderful discovery,
viz., as to the manipulation of an
electrical ray which can be focussed
like light, and which is capable of
paralyzing armies as easily as if a
stroke of lightning had passed
through their ranks.

In a trial experiment it is stated
that the ray was brought to bear upon
a poor old horse, at a range of four

the political field. His resignation

He had been delivering an address to
the students on William Pitt and be-
fore he had spoken five minutes the
constant repetition of the great
statesman's name suggested another
pit, and he devoted the rest of the
hour to a violent dissertation on Pre-
mier Roblin. This came to the ears
of the faculty and it was decided that
the noble professor was a little too
queer for his job.

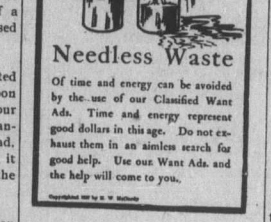
An amusing incident occurred at
Professor Osborne's first political
meeting in Dufferin county. He has
a remarkable gift of the gab, and is
great on dramatic effect. He was
holding forth in a crowded country
schoolhouse and unpeeling language
with the rapidity of a rotary engine.

"What can I do?" he roared, "when I
see my country going to ruin, when I
see our oppressors' hands at our

throats strangling us, and the black
clouds of hopelessness and despair
gathering on the horizon to obliterate
the golden sun of prosperity? What,
I ask, can I do?"
"Sit down," shouted the audience.
Roblin's majority at the polls was
around 500.

said to have made a fine impression,
and was regarded as exceedingly ef-
fective. His colleagues, including
