

### Skipper of "Teddy Bear" Arrives in Ottawa on Way to P. E. Island

Spends Four Years in Arctic And Was Frezen In Ice Of Cornation Gulf For More Than 24 Hours-Had Not

four winters in the Arctic, having been being unaware that the war was over until a year after the armistice, Captain Joseph Bernard, skipper of the little gasoline schooner "Teddy Bear"

located in the north since 1901, but only since 1909 did he take to trading in the Canadian Arctic, fitting the icy desolation of Victoria Island, King William Land and Cornation Gulf. Canadian Arctic Expedition which set sail in 1913.

His little ship wintered in Coronation Gulf in 1916, the first time any ship wintered there since Captain Cellinson, Royal Navy, did so in the

Collinson was looking for survivors of the Franklin Expedition which in 1847 set out to discover the North vest passage.

The tragic end of that expedition is history. The men-one hundred and five in all-abandoned the ship, deserted their captain and attempted to reach civilization by way of the mainland to the south. Not till twenty-three- years later was the story unfolded and that was through the trail of skeletons along the route the men took.

Captain Bernard heard talk of ranklin even last year. The na ives-Eskimos-still have the story letters, and Captain Bernard is quite ertain that it is a relic of the Frankin ship. Other pieces of brass were rought back, rescued from natives who were making bullets from them. The "Teddy Bear" was frozen in from August 17, 1917 till September 2nd, 1919.

### OPEN SHOP POLICY TO BE ENDORSED

Bethlehem Steel Corporation

NEW YORK, Dec. 15-The Bethleem Steel Corporation will refuse to ell fabricated steel to builders and contractors in the New York and Phil iadelphia districts to be erected onn a union shop basis.

This policy was disclosed by Eugene G. Grace, president of the Corporation, who testified to-day before the joint legislative committee investigating the alleged "building trust," replying to charges that his concern was sponsoring the "open shop" movement by withholding steel from builders employing union men.

"I think it is a proper thing to protect the open shop principle," declared Mr. Grace, who explained that his stand would not be changed even if building operations in New York were to be suspeded because steel could not be obtained by union erectors. Whether the corporation will exend its policy to other parts of the United States, the witness said, 'de pends "entirely on what effect should expect it to have on our ge eral labor situation."
