#### POLISH GARDEN CITY

WARSAW QUITE ENTHUSIASTIC OV-  
ER THE MOVEMENT AND IS  
PUSHING IT.

London, Sept. 28—At the recent in-  
ternational garden cities and town plan-  
ning congress a paper was read by Dr.  
W. T. Dobryzynski on the garden suburb  
of Warsaw. In the course of his paper  
Dr. Dobryzynski said:

"My first acquaintance with the work  
of the Garden Cities Association was  
made in the year 1907, at the interna-  
tional congress of hygiene held at Ber-  
lin. After hearing a speech by H. Kamp-  
ffmeyer, I became deeply interested in  
the movement, and since then I have done  
my utmost to give publicity to the scheme  
and to forward it in every possible way.

"After 18 months' propaganda I have  
succeeded in forming a group, as a section  
of our Hygienic Society, with the same  
general objects as those of the Garden  
Cities Association, adapted to the con-  
ditions of life in Poland. Among many  
methods of advertising the scheme, such  
as lectures in Warsaw and other cities,  
Lodz, Sosnowice, Czestochowa, Lublin  
and so on, and the distribution of pam-  
phlets we have organized with very suc-  
cessful results an exhibition of plans  
models of houses, dwellings and streets  
kindly lent by our German fellow work-  
ers.

"One of our greatest achievements  
was the drawing up of a statute for the  
prevention of speculation on estates and  
dwellings, which has been approved by  
the government. The statute grants to  
the society the prior right of buying pro-  
perties from the members. We have  
also purchased an estate of 30 acres, with  
an option for 210 more, to be bought with-  
in four years at the rate of from 1000 to  
2000 roubles per acre. The estate has  
been very ably laid out by a well-known  
architect, Mr. Bernoulli.

"The plan is in all respects, economi-  
cally hygienically and aesthetically, high-  
ly suitable. The building of houses will  
begin immediately on the completion of  
an electric tramway in a few months.  
As our funds are as yet low we have de-  
cided to begin building houses only for  
such shareholders as will pay the full  
amount required. On receiving credit  
from our bank we can build for share-  
holders who will pay less, and finally,  
when our funds permit, we shall construct  
dwellings to let to workmen. By these  
means we shall give a public example  
which we hope to see followed first in  
Warsaw, where the conditions of housing  
are so unfavorable, and afterward in  
other cities in Poland."

#### KIAO CHAU

SOME INTERESTING FACTS IN RE-  
GARD TO THE GERMAN  
POSSESSIONS IN  
CHINA

The Hague, Holland—A Dutchman  
who returned recently from visiting Kiao-  
chau refers to that part of the country  
in an article published in a leading Dutch  
paper. The annexation of this port by  
the Germans, he says, was merely the  
result of the policy generally adopted  
by the different nations at that time.

England, he continues, has Hongkong  
as the result of the opium war, whilst  
Russia annexed Port Arthur and Talien-  
wan in Koang-Tsiao-wan, and England  
felt that she could not do without Wei-  
Hai-Wei. Germany also was looking  
about for a little place at the table, and  
the well-known geographer and geologist,  
Ferdinand Baron von Richthofen, who in  
1869 had traveled for three months thru  
the province of Siantong situated on the  
bay of Kiao-Chau, drew the attention of  
his government to the enormous com-  
mercial importance on this bay and the sur-  
rounding territory.

Inland the richest minerals are found,  
whilst the construction of a good harbor  
near Tjing-tao presented no insurmount-  
able difficulties. With a view to verify-  
ing the latter statement, Vice-Admiral  
von Tirpitz, commander of the German  
squadron in Chinese waters, visited the  
bay accompanied by an expert in 1897.

His report was favorable. German ne-  
gotiations with China were then opened,  
but the German offer was promptly re-  
fused, and on Nov. 1 of the same year  
the assault on some missionaries was used  
as a pretext for taking possession as Tjing-  
tao and the bay of Kiao-Chau, a lease of  
the territory for 99 years being signed.  
Numerous restrictions were also made.


The city itself contains a garrison of  
over 3000 men. Forts or other military  
works are, however, not visible, owing  
to the fact that the Germans have dis-  
covered from previous experiences in  
German West Africa, that the natives  
object to anything in the nature of mili-  
tary demonstration and prefer that forts,  
guns and even barracks, should not be  
visible.

Coal and iron ore is plentiful in the  
neighborhood, as well as gold, diamonds,  
lead, mica, silver, copper, marble, tin,

quicksilver, sulphur, asbestos and other  
minerals are found in considerable quan-  
tities. Coal is exceptionally abundant,  
this valuable mineral being picked up on  
the surface of the ground natives.

#### WATCHES IN ODD SETTINGS

The first watches which were invented  
in Germany in the fifteenth century were  
introduced into England during the ear-  
lier years of Elizabeth's reign. From  
Shakespeare and other writers we gather  
that it was the fashion to have the watch-  
es set in rings, bracelets, handles of canes  
or in the heads of tiny figures of men or  
animals made of silver. Up to the time  
of Charles I, people carried their watches  
hanging at the end of gold or silver chains  
from their necks or their waists, but at  
that period the Puritans introduced the  
fob watch and chain. John Milton owned  
a watch which indicated the day of the  
month as well as the hour. A London  
watchmaker presented George III, with  
a watch, said to be one of the smallest  
in the world, set in a ring. The Czar  
of Russia offered the maker 1000 guineas  
for another like it, but he refused as he  
wished his present to the King to be uni-  
que.
