Toronto Live Stock. Receipts of live stock since Tuesday, at the City Cattle Market, as reported by the railways, were 145 carloads, composed of 2,242 cattle, 1,388 hogs, 3,276 sheep and lambs, and about 200 calves. Besides the above, there were seven carloads of hogs that went direct to the packing houses. The quality of cattle was the worst of the season. Frank Shields, the oldest of the old-time cattle dealers, said that he never in all his time had seen so many poor quality cattle on the Toronto market. Exporters—None on sale, excepting a few bulls, which sold at lower prices than at any time this year, at \$3.25 to \$4 per cwt. Butchers—The highest price quoted for selected lots was \$4.65, which is a big drop, and there were few bought at that price. Best loads sold from \$4 to \$4.50; \$3 and \$3.85; inferior, \$2.50 to \$2.75; canners, \$1 to \$2; cows, \$2.50 to \$3.75. Feeders and Stockers—Good feeders,

It is believed that there must shortly be a better demand for iron and copper, consumers having small supplies and some of them being about ready to give orders. COBALT NOTES

The Larder Lake Proprietors Gold Fields, Limited, has received reports of the first mill run from one of their property.

The Golden Peak Larder Lake Exploration and Mining Company has discovered a new fissure vein of gold, 12 inches wide, on Lot No. 2 of their property. This makes the third discovery of the company, and it is claimed that excellent progress is being made.

Continuous rains around Larder Lake have retarded development work considerably. The only feasible route to the district is by portage, and the new road from Boston to Larder has been converted into a bog by the rains of the past month. More rain than during any other summer of the past twenty years has fallen at Larder Lake this season.

The Harris-Maxwell properties, have decided to put up a stamp mill, which will ultimately be of 100 stamps, but at the start will be of 10 stamps. Reports from the property say that the development work has been well conducted, and has realized good showings.

Sheep and Lambs—The run was one of the largest of the season, and, like all other classes, there was a large percentage of poor quality, which sold at the lowest prices of the season. Export ewes sold at \$1.25 to \$1.40; rams at \$1 to \$3.50 per cwt.; lambs sold from \$3 to \$5.70 per cwt., but the latter price is for selected lots. Those sold at \$4 per cwt. were culls, one drover taking a double deck of these back to the country to feed. As usual, 90 per cent. of all the lambs were bucks.

Hogs—Like everything else, the quality of many of the hogs was not good. Since peas have gone to 80c and over per bushel, and barley 70c, the farmers are neglecting their best friend, the hog, and many of them are now producing a lot of poor quality hogs. As a result, \$6.12 1/2 and culls at \$5.50 per cwt.

The Horse Market. A waiting game seems to be the attitude of the farmers and horseholders regarding the sales of horses this fall. Farmers in the country are slow to accept any lower figures for the time. Sales are reported at many points of horses around the \$200 mark. Good arrivals are still purchased on the future.

Dear Salt. New York, Oct. 4.—A tacit understanding has been reached between the International Salt Co., known as the salt trust, and certain independent manufacturers in regard to regulating the future course of the market for evaporated salt, according to statements made in well informed quarters, says the Journal of Commerce to-day. As a result of the understanding prices have recently been advanced 50 cents to \$1 per ton from the low figures prevailing a month ago, when sharp price-cutting was in progress.

New York, Oct. 4.—Wall Street.—The first price of Can. Pac. advanced a gain of 1 1/4 over last night. Great Northern, 1 and Virginia Carolina Chemical, 1/8. Otherwise there were small fractional gains as a rule mixed with a few losses. The dealings were scanty.

Pittsburg, Oct. 4.—Oil opened \$1.78.

New York, Oct. 4.—The market during the morning recorded slight changes. London operations being about even and important local trading about equally divided between the buyers and sellers. Consols showed an advance in London on investment, demand being 9-16 higher, and Paris turned buyer of its specialties there. London has a rumor that there is a fear of some financial readjustment of S. R., in order to protect the bond holders. Copper metal is higher abroad. The subway of Interboro Rapid Transit submits a statement that the earnings and income show \$254,206 increase for the two months ending Aug. 31st, to which ratio of income must be added substantial receipts from the Brooklyn Tunnel, to be opened before the end of the year. Last year the company earned over \$500,000 in excess of the 9 per cent. dividend, which goes to pay the
