what advantage might be secured when the question of submitting the repeal of local option comes up next year. The estimate was that though the vote split even with the male voters, there was sufficient of a support in the three hundred and fifty women voters to give them control of the Council.

An analysis of the vote shows no specific attack on any individual member of the local option ticket. All shared alike in the landslide, though the majorities may differ. The compilation of the returns was a heavy undertaking, owing to the long list of candidates. The result of the polls was as follows: For Mayor—Kennedy, 1,176; McQuaker, 991; majority, 185.
