Regular Monthly Meeting Of T. L. League

Nearly Enough Signatures for Repeal of Scott Act—Lively Discussion Promised
Next Monday Night

The regular monthly meeting of Newcastle Temperance League was held at the Police Court Room Tuesday evening, James M. Troy in the chair. Others present were: Rev. Dr. W. Squires, Rev. S. Gray, Joseph Under, Fred E. Locke and the Secretary, H. H. Stuart.

and Newcastle has been only partly canvassed as yet.

The failure of the Local Legislature to invoke the aid of the "Debarry Act" was regretted. Glowing accounts were given of the working of the new Prohibition Act.

The president reported that practically no one had asked the increased

Production Committee for help to cultivate.

The committee had planted about 13 barrels of potatoes in the Wholes and J. D. Cressman's fields. Only \$110 had so far been subscribed.

Rev. Dr. Squires brought up the matter of conscription, saying that as we were living in a very critical time, calling for personal sacrifice, not only conscription of men was necessary but also that of wealth. Which was more valuable—human life or property. If the Government has the right to lay its hands upon our young men and take them to the trenches if has infinitely greater right to lay its hands on the great railway, banking, manufacturing and munition making interests of the country and conscript the wealth of the same. This has already been done by the Presbyterian General Assembly, Methodist Conference, Anglican Synod, Baptist meetings and other meetings in Vancouver and elsewhere.

The President—Yes, and by a large majority of the St. John Labor men recently.

Dr. Squires continuing asked, How not the government the right to take from surplus wealth enough to pay 75 or any per centage to the war?

The referendum would be a great thing for those who want defeat—the slackers, those who are profiting from munitions work, the liquor traffic, etc., would all favor it, and vote against conscription. He stood up (Continued on page 8)

Miramichi Presbytery At Jacquet River

Honors Rev. S. J. MacArthur—
Most Searching Addresses
Heard

The regular quarterly meeting of Miramichi Presbytery was held at Jacquet River on Tuesday.

There were three sessions. Besides the ordinary business, three addresses were given, two by Professor Shaw of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, on the war's challenge to the church. Prof. Shaw discussed the question from two view points: First, The war's demand upon the church in view of the situation at the end of the war when the men shall have returned to their homes; and in his second address, given at the evening session, the Prof. discussed the duty of the church from the point of view of the hastening of the longed for peace.

The Professor began with the sovereignty of God. He is over all. God sits King upon this flood. He is making it an occasion of a new call to His people and the world. This is a veritable day of the Lord of crisis or Divine judgment. We are looking forward with deep wistfulness for the day of peace in our warrent world, and it is the duty of the church to take thought for that future now.

An amazing number of the men at the front have no use for the church as an organized body, yet these are breathing the very atmosphere which should be the church's, the atmosphere of service and sacrifice. These men will look upon the church with new eyes when they return and the church will be able to win their adherences only in proportion as we manifest the same spirit as they have manifested. Their judgment of us will not be formed in an anti-Christian spirit; but they will evaluate the church in the light of Reality. Never has the church been faced with such an opportunity, nor ever shall be again probably.

The war's demand upon the church will include first of all a new conscience as to the meaning of communion membership. Membership without obligation is a terrible fact in the church today. The early Christians' life and conduct were the great apologetic for their faith. They submitted "The Way" in their living as fully as in their preaching. The war's demand is that the same become true again. Have we not been trying to find the token of communion

Forty-Sixth Session District Division

Held at Douglastown Tuesday—
Increased Membership
Reported

The 46th quarterly session of the New-Northumberland District Division, Sons of Temperance, met at Douglastown Temperance Hall Tuesday afternoon, 26th instant, with a public speaking in the evening.

Representatives were present from Hazzcourt, Newcastle and Douglastown divisions. Rev. R. H. Stayer, D. W. P., presided, H. H. Stuart secretary.

The D. W. P.'s report strongly commended the new Prohibition law. His information was that in St. John City and other places it was an unqualified success. There had been only two or three cases of drunkenness in St. John police court since May last—a wonderful change. There was a great difference in families whose men used to drink, but now come home sober. It was too bad that liquor could still be brought in from Quebec. But there were signs of the Dominion passing a general Prohibition law.

The secretary reported a small increase in membership of the divisions reporting. The Northumberland Temperance Alliance had nearly enough signatures to bring on a vote for repeal of the Scott Act.

Report on the State of the Order.

- 3.—We rejoice that the admirable new Provincial Prohibition law, passed by the late government, has been so promptly and successfully carried into effect by its successor in office. It is a matter, too, of great satisfaction to note the willingness with which the people in former countries have accepted the new situation, and the great benefits already resulting from its operation.
