The bill of costs in the Hills contempt of court case amounts to \$3,625.46.

J. W. Foye, grocer of St. John, N. B., has resigned. Liability \$7,000.

Mr. C. Lepage, of North Rustico, lost a valuable horse in the ice on Monday last week.

Two brothers named Forbes were drowned at Wood's Harbor, N. S., on Friday, while visiting home traps.

A fire in the village of Tisbury, N. S., Monday morning, destroyed seven stores and three or four dwelling houses.

A boy named Tom, seventeen years of age, was killed at Clyde River, N. S., on Monday, by falling from a hay mow.

The Department of Railways has decided to build a branch of railway from Windsor Junction to Dartmouth, N. S.

The ice boat service commences at the Copes today. Arrangements have been made to have the boats leave both sides this morning.

A BRANCH of the United Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen has been formed at Moncton. The headquarters of the organization are at Ottawa.

During the storm of Saturday night the dwelling house of Mrs. Smith, North Rustico, was destroyed by fire. The building was insured for \$200.

On Thursday Mayor Haviland forwarded to Mr. Fielding of Alberta, treasurer of the Grand M. P. Order, a sum of twenty thousand dollars.

Two new post offices were established last month via Coble Head West, Lot 1, and Savage Harbor, Lot 25, both in King's Co. Messrs. Garrett and Elias Gull are the respective post masters.

Rev. J. A. McMillan, D. D., lecturer before Division No. 1, A. O. H., this day, succeeded during the rest of the month. His subject will be "Garcia Moreno." The Division intends having four lectures delivered in the rooms during the winter.

Mr. WALSH, of this city was in Summer, side last week, endeavoring to organize a company to put in an electric light plant in that town. The way of the Summer-side people is yet lighted by the primitive oil lamp; and they are badly in need of the more modern method of street lighting.


