

London advices of the 27th ult., says the Marquis of Salisbury, replying to a letter in which the writer pointed out that during the past ten years the country has spent £320,000,000 on imported wheat and flour, and that the importation of flour instead of wheat had resulted in a loss of £18,000,000, promises to consider the writer's suggestion regarding the payment of a bounty to wheat growers and the admission of wheat free, while a duty is planned for imported flour.

An important communication was received by cable at the department of agriculture Ottawa, on Thurday last from Sir Charles Tupper intimating that the Imperial board of agriculture had issued an order to the effect that sheep imported into Great Britain from Canada, and the United States must be also whered at the port of landing on ing quarantine against American sheep at ports on the frontier. Such action would have been followed by the stoppage of traffic as respects the importations in trade through Canadian ports, and what is of the greatest importance, immediate reprisals by the states. Information in the possession of the department is positive on the last point.
