The Tarte-Greiner libel case in Montreal, came to a close on Saturday, the jury returning a verdict of guilty against Greiner.

It is reported from London that Japan intends spending \$127,000,000 in England, during the next eight years in developing her navy.

GENERAL NEIL DOW, the famous prohibitionist, died at his home in Portland, Maine, on Saturday last. He was 93 years of age.

BERLIN advices say that the Prussian police are on the track of a powerful anti-dynastic movement in South Germany which includes many members of the best families.

A New York dispatch of the 2nd says that Eugene Knowlton and his wife fell on the street falling from a ladder while their three famished children clung about them. He said he could not work. A crowd gathered and gave them money and food.

SIR WILLIAM LATHRAN offered the portfolio of Justice to Hon David Mills and the latter has indicated his willingness to accept the same; consequently Mr. Mills becomes Minister of Justice on the retirement of Sir William Lathran to become Lieutenant Governor of Ontario in a week or two.

A STRAWBERRY at Seattle on the 2nd reported that the stores at Dawson had been compelled to close as their stock of provisions had been exhausted. It is considered doubtful if any supplies can get up this fall. Many persons are returning from the Klondike with but little gold.

OTTAWA advices of the 2nd inst. say that the Minister of Trade and Commerce has decided to call tenders for carrying Canadian mails to and from Great Britain for one year from the 25th of November. A condition of the contract is that the terminus on this side of the Atlantic must be a Canadian port.

D. J. KANE, Esq., United States Consul at Charlottetown for the past four years, left for Boston on the Halifax on Friday last, accompanied by Mrs. Kane and the family. While here Mr. and Mrs. Kane made home and friends who will be glad to hear of their future prosperity. Mr. Kane is succeeded as Consul here by D. J. Vale, Esq., of Vermont.

The fall arrangements of the Prince Edward Island Railway time table went into effect on Monday last. The morning express for Summerside leaves here at 7:15 local time and runs through to Tignish. The evening express from the west is due at Charlottetown at 4:30 local time. The morning train for Souris leaves here at 10:10 p.m. and Souris at 7:30 local on return will leave Souris at 1 p.m. local, connecting at Royalton Junction with the accommodation for Summerside which leaves Charlottetown at 4:30 local. The afternoon train for Souris leaves here at 4:10 p.m. and Souris at 7:10 local the following morning.

Two comrades named Rogers and Newcombs came over from Newfoundland this spring, and began work in Albert county. A few weeks ago the former had his head sawed off in a mill, and his wages were utilized in sending the body home for burial. The other said if anything should happen him that he wanted them to bury his body wherever he was at work, and send the money home as it would do more good. Last Thursday at Riverside, Albert county, he was killed in the pit of the stomach by a horse from a trestle mill and sent down dead. On Sunday his remains were interred in the cemetery of the village where the fatal accident occurred. This seems a rather strange incident.—Moncton Times.

A SERIES of larcenies have been perpetrated upon a well known firm of grocers in this city. The loss on account of which must be considerable. The articles stolen have been mostly flour and sugar. A few days ago the matter was reported to the Supt. of Police, and they found a partially filled barrel of sugar in the house of a certain colored citizen, the barrel bearing the name of the firm from whom the sugar had been stolen.
