A man charged with loose and disorderly conduct, and who was without visible means of support, was ordered to find two sureties or in default six months in the Penitentiary.

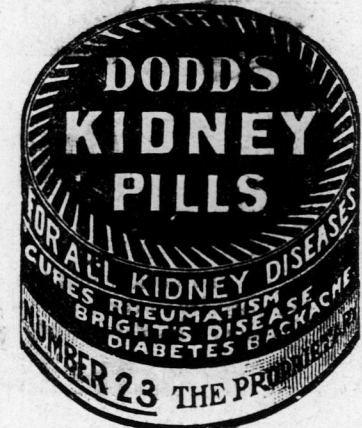
Inspector Collins vs. Peter Power for furious and improper driving and also for cruelly ill-treating a horse. Defendant was fined \$5 for each offence.

Fire Bug About.

For two days preceding the big blast on Bell Island some mysterious outbreaks of fire were recorded there. In the first place the woods at the rear of the Island were fired and a big force of men had to work hard to quench it. Then the interior of the D. I. S. Co.'s staff house was found to be on fire, and but that the discovery was made quickly the place would have been destroyed. An unused room of Dr. Carnochan's surgery was next found to be on fire and was also kept from being destroyed by prompt and effective work. In the big conflagration of Thursday morning it is believed that it originated in a rear store of Kent & Hearne's place. A lot of oil was stored there, and when the people left at 6 p.m. everything was intact. The fire broke



out at 1.50 a.m., and the belief now is that a fire bug is about the Island and that in each of these cases cited he threw matches into the establishments by opening windows at the rear. The police are investigating.

The Sagona on the Bar.

Strikes on the Bar at Entrance of Harbor Grace—Will Come Off.

While going out of Harbor Grace this morning at 1.30 on her way to Labrador the S. S. Sagona, Capt. Parsons, went ashore on the Bar which is about 200 yards off Point of Beach.

It was very dark and thick at the time and the ship, we hear, was running at less than half speed when the accident occurred. The bottom there is sandy and the Reid Nfld. Co. believe she will float off easily at high tide.

All the passengers, several of whom are tourists from the United States, are remaining on board, and passengers by the local train to-day say the water is very smooth where she struck and that no danger to the ship is apprehended, though should a N. E. wind come up a heavy sea would heave in and make matters bad for her.

The Prospero left for the scene of the accident this forenoon, and the Ethie left Carbonear at 11.45 to render any necessary assistance. It is likely some of the freight on board will be transferred to these ships to facilitate the floating of the steamer.

We learn from the Reid Nfld. Co. that the ship is making no water and it is not thought she will suffer much damage. She is not tilted but is perfectly upright, and when she struck there was no panic, Capt. Parsons and his officers re-assuring the passengers—all of whom were in their state-rooms. Messages were received by the Anglo and Postal Telegraphs of the same purport as those which the Reid Nfld. Co. got.

Hon. J. C. Crosbie went to the scene by the Prospero and Mr. St. Hill went out by train.

The ship is fully covered by insurance. If the ship is not damaged much she will resume her voyage as quickly as possible.

The Country Discredited.

Dear Sir,—I have noticed your comments on the Premier's latest attempt to deal with finance, and I think your criticism milder than the facts warrant. It is evident from the wretched result of the Colony's negotiations of another railway of two million dollars that the present Government is discredited in England as well as here. When the leader of the Government forgets his representative position and makes himself and the country the laughing stock of the Empire (vide Sir Edward Morris's interviews with reporters of the London press, and his response to the toast of the Dominions at Captain Boyd Carpenter's dinner), it is not surprising that level-headed business men fight shy of our bonds. In England Sir Edward Morris would be sized up very quickly, and the country would suffer proportionately. The excuse given for the mess that has been made of the country's finances in England by Sir Edward Morris is a very lame excuse, for a recent issue of New Zealand 3½ Bonds was made at 99, and the closing price for them on the 4th July was par. I enclose you a clipping from a Stock Exchange Report taken from the London Standard to show you what I state is correct. If New Zealand can command 99 for her 3½ per cent. Bonds, why was Newfoundland to accept 93? The answer is clear—the country has been discredited by Morris and his gang.
