## Bond Can't Lose!

DISTRICT OF TRINITY GIVING OP-  
POSITION CANDIDATES GRAND  
RECEPTION.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
**PORT REXTON, To-day.**  
The Opposition candidates left Catalina Saturday morning and saluted of guns from schooners and hills lined with men. Great reception and demonstration at English Harbor in the afternoon and procession from the wharf to the hall amidst incessant firing volleys from 70 or 80 guns. Hall packed; meeting lasting nearly three hours amidst extraordinary enthusiasm. After the meeting a demonstration to the wharf. Women out waving handkerchiefs and shawls. English Harbor will poll almost every vote for Bond and Coalition. At night at Port Rexton and "save" the crowd. Hall packed almost to suffocation. Speeches lasted almost three hours and a half. Unanimous vote on meeting was for Coalition under leadership of Sir Robert Bond. Enthusiasm was contagious. People are practically unanimous in support of Lloyd, Stone and Targett. Never before has there been such a strong feeling against any Government. Morris candidates would not save their nomination fees. They are the same as the two Catalinas, Ellison, English, Sir, Chamneys, Port Rexton, Trinity East. They can only secure a scattered vote here and there. At 7 this morning guns are being fired all around the harbor almost every man in these places are Union and strongly endorse Bond and Conker and the united parties.

## Serious Accident.

Two Men Seriously Injured—One Man Dies in Hospital.

While driving to their homes in Logy Bay, on Saturday night, Richard Pendergast and Michael Dyer met with serious injuries, the former's proving fatal.  
The direct cause of the accident is not exactly known and enquiries are now being made by the men in town on Saturday together and left for home between 6 and 7 o'clock in the evening. They were driving a young horse, attached to long cart and on which was a barrel of beef. There was no eye witness to what happened, but it is alleged that the barrel of beef removed from its position on the cart and causing that part of the harness, known as the "belly band" to become tight and "save" the horse. The animal is scarcely five years old and consequently very spirited. The two men were barely half way home when the horse lay down on the road side. They were first discovered, it is said, by the keeper of the Links on Logy Bay Road. This man immediately telephoned to the police station and Dr. Roberts went along with the ambulance hurried to the scene. Pendergast was first attended to. A temporary examination was made and his injuries were pronounced to be beyond recovery. He was then driven to hospital. He never regained consciousness and at ten o'clock yesterday morning passed away. Dyer, who is badly cut and bruised and badly hurt internally, is confined to his home, but there is every hope of his recovery.  
The terrible happening has caused no small amount of mourning in the village of Logy Bay. Deceased was 35 years of age and unmarried.

## Obituary.

This morning the grim reaper Death, came and removed with unusual suddenness from our midst an old and respected resident of the East End, in the person of Mr. Thomas Kelly, sr. The cause of his demise was heart trouble. Deceased was in the best of health yesterday as he accompanied by his two grand-children, visited the house of Captain Nichols, his brother-in-law. Last evening he attended evening prayers and when retiring at 11 o'clock never complained. At five o'clock this morning he got up to go to work and while dressing himself was suddenly stricken with spasms of the heart. His son, Thomas, hearing his father gasping, hastened to his aid and in an instant the father lay cold in death in the arms of his son. Deceased was 70 years of age, being predeceased by his wife. He was 35 years in H.M. Customs and of late years was engaged as Suffrance Warehouse Keeper (H.M.C.) at Shea & Co's. He was an exemplary, good-living and inoffensive citizen and a prominent member of the B.I.S. and Holy Name Societies. He is survived by four sons, Rev. P. Kelly, of St. Patrick's Parish, Thomas, at the Board of Works Office; John, the stone cutter and Charles at Knowling's, besides a number of grand-children and other relatives, to all of whom general and sincere sympathy will be expressed.

## The Shoe Factory Trouble.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir:—Permit us to make a statement in regard to the strike which is at present on at the Boot & Shoe Factory. We are moved to this by the letter of Manager Thompson and his request by our Union. We would say that in August our men returned to work after seven weeks idleness. After one week working one of our lasters was cut from ten cents a pair to eight and a half cents on Ice Grain Work. After some discussion the Manager offered him nine cents, which the man refused, and he was told that if he would not do that he would not be allowed to do any kind of work in the lasting line, and another laster was told that there would be no work for him until the matter was settled. We might here state that this involved the work of six men, as we are all depending on one another it made our wages very small, which after seven weeks idleness made things very bad. The matter was laid before our Union and much discussed, and much correspondence took place between the Union and our employer without any satisfactory results. In the meantime one of our men was sent for to go to work, and on reporting he was told that he could go to work providing he would agree in the event of trouble with the Union, he would remain at work. He refused, and was told his job was gone. Some more of our men were told that if they went out with the Union they would stay out. It was decided by our Union to go on strike at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, the 23rd, and at ten minutes to nine the power was stopped as the manager said to give us a chance to go out quietly. In view of these facts, we fail to understand how our manager can say, "that he don't know why we are out, or what we are out for," and we will leave it to the public to say, on which side right or might was used.
