The Russian Oftensive.



the reports that are coming of the Russian activities against Austria until their rigid censorship has permitted something more definite to be published to the world. Enough, however, has been made known to indi-cate that the movement is not an isolated one, but of huge proportions, extending along the entire Austrian

Almost exactly twelve months ago the Russians were in full retreat be-fore the tremendous onset of the com-bined German and Austrian forces. The terrific bombardment of Przemysl and its almost instantaneous fall, contrasting so strongly with the long-drawn out siege that gave it to Russia, will be well remembered. It was followed naturally by the loss of Lemberg, which is now mentioned as once more being in imminent danger of recapture by the Russians. This is probable enough, if to-day's news can be trusted, that the Russians have arrived within the vicinity of the line of the Strypa River. At the same time they are keeping the Germans busy in the northern zone, and it is unlikely that these will be able to lend the Austrians much assistance.

Accepting with reserve the Rusmost important effect that any large success by our Allies here would have is the immediate relaxation of the strain to which Italy is being sub-jected. Although the Austrians have not progressed much of late in their drive along the Trentino, the vigour of their attack has not been diminished in the least, and the Italians have been sore put to it to hold the line before Vicenza. But Austria has committed herself to a great offensive here, which her losses in Volhynia and Galicia may now compel her to abandon. Withdrawal of large numbers of Austrian troops to the East frontier would inevitably be followed by renewed activity of the Italian armies, both in the Trentino itself and in the region of the Isonzo and Gorizia. The whole conditions of the present situation are such that changes in one part of it may produce rapidly corresponding changes in another. For this reason the great movement now under way in the East is of the first importance in the West, and is pro-bably the herald of great events.
