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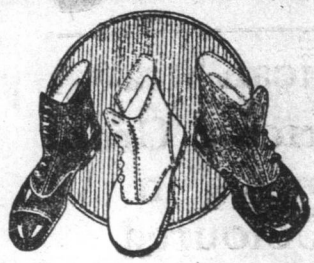

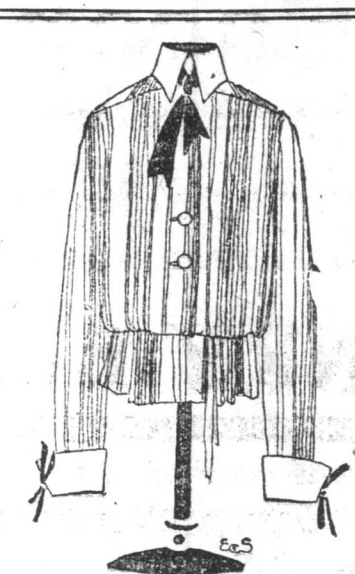

LAND OF OLD MEN.

More Than Half of the Youth of France Lost in War.

PARIS, France, May 25.—Capt. Andre Tardieu, head of the general commission for Franco-American war matters, made an investigation into the number of French soldiers killed between the age of 20 and 31. He found that 58 per cent had lost their lives. That is, that more than half of France's young men disappeared.
