TO SWIM CHANNEL.

DOVER, Aug. 25.
Henry Sullivan of Lowell, Mass., started at eight forty o'clock this evening, in an attempt to swim the English Channel from Dover to Calais. This is the first attempt since the outbreak of the war to swim the Channel.

UNIQUE SERVICE.

DUNDALK, Ireland, Aug. 25.
One thousand men employed in the Railway Works here, laid down their tools to-day and marched to the Cathedral to pray for the release of the Lord Mayor of Cork. The church was crowded, many kneeling outside the edifice. When the service was concluded the men resumed their work.

WORK FOR I.C.

LONDON, Aug. 25.
The Lucerne Correspondent of the London Times says that Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland will reach Lucerne to-morrow, when the Irish question will engage the close attention of Premier Lloyd George.

INVOLVED.

LONDON, Aug. 25.
At the Foreign Office, and at No. 10 Downing Street, the official residence of Lloyd George, denial was given to reports to-day that M. Kamenoff had applied for passports for his return to Russia. M. Kamenoff declined to affirm or deny the report that he intended to return to Russia. The report was received with great surprise in official quarters, where, it was believed, the Russian delegation at least would wait until a reply had been sent to the note of Arthur J. Balfour, Lord President of the Council.

HEART STEALER JAILED.

LONDON, Aug. 25.
Paul Mellor, ex-army officer, who was recently arrested on a charge of fraud, was to-day sentenced to twelve months imprisonment. Mellor is the officer who figured in the Helen Butler episode recently, when the typist was reshipped from Halifax to London, following her refusal to marry her original fiancé, Capt. Kitchen of Sydney.

DIDN'T WANT RESPONSIBILITY.

LONDON, Aug. 25.
Lord Stradbroke has been appointed Governor of Victoria, Australia, succeeding Hon. Lyndell Stanley. A motion recently was made in the Victorian Parliament that future appointments be made by the state itself, but it was defeated.

A UNIVERSAL BLESSING.

PARIS, Aug. 25.
The destruction of the Bolshevik armies now may be considered complete, according to advices received. Of the host which swept down upon Warsaw, nothing is left but thirty thousand fugitives. Poles have taken eighty thousand prisoners thus far, but what is more important they have captured a great number of guns and materials. It is considered probable that the Soviets employed all of their available resources, and in the present condition of Russian industries it will take a long time to replace them. Consequently if Soviets are able to find effective with which to seek to restore the fortunes of their arms, lack of equipment will make them without military value.

WITHOUT BENEFIT OF LAW.

GRAHAM, N.C., Aug. 25.
Accused of attempting an attack on a four year old girl, John Jeffress, a negro, was shot to death yesterday by a mob of fifty men.

TRANSCONTINENTAL FLIGHT.

NOME, Alaska, Aug. 25.
"We are enthusiastic over the success of our flight, because it accomplished what was believed to be impossible, viz., the establishment of aerial communication with Alaska." Capt. Street, head of the New York to Nome air expedition, yesterday summed up the transcontinental flight.

ORGY OF CRIME.

DUBLIN, Aug. 25.
Outrages continue to be reported from various places. Armed citizens yesterday attacked and overpowered a party of Cameron Highlanders, outside Queenstown, one soldier dying later from injuries. Constables Hough and McNamara were shot and killed Tuesday near Bantry.

SCENE AT CHURCH.

BELFAST, Aug. 25.
St. Matthew's Catholic Church was yesterday the scene of a dangerous outbreak, which held grave possibilities. Soldiers were obliged to fire over the heads of the crowd and finally directed the fire upon it before it was dispersed.

MAJORITY FAVOR STRIKE.

LONDON, Aug. 25.
Ballotting of coal miners, which has been proceeding throughout the country yesterday, was going largely in favor of a strike, with the voting in many places three to one in favor of striking, and the Welsh miners vir-

tually unanimous for it. There seems to be a general belief that the other trade unions will refuse to countenance a miners' strike.

SEIZURES AND FINES.

WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 25.
Since April 1st seventy thousand cases of liquor with a Canadian valuation of two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars and a bootlegging value of four times that sum have been confiscated by the local inspector's office, and fines amounting to two hundred and fifteen thousand dollars have been collected during the same period.

An Act to Provide for the Better Obtaining of Information Respecting the Codfishery.

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—

1. The Master or owner of every ship, vessel, schooner, craft or boat which shall arrive at any port in Newfoundland from fishing in any of the places following, that is to say, on the Banks, on the Coast of Labrador, in the Straits of Belle Isle, or elsewhere out of Newfoundland, and on the coast of Newfoundland in the District of St. Barbe, shall within 48 hours after arrival at his destination report by telegraph at the expense of the Department from the nearest telegraph station to the Department of Marine and Fisheries at St. John's and the nearest Customs Officer, stating the quantity in quintals of fish on board such vessel.
2. As a part of said report the said Master or owner shall state whether the number of quintals reported is reckoned as of dry fish, Labrador fish, salt bulk or green fish, or otherwise as the case may be; and shall state whether it is the intention of such master or owner to cure such fish (if the same be not cured) as salt Labrador, dry Labrador, or dry Shore.
3. If any such Master or owner shall fail to report as aforesaid or shall wilfully report incorrectly, he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00, to be recovered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magistrate, or in default of payment, to imprisonment not exceeding one month.
4. In publishing information or statistics of the fisheries, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall not be bound to make public the name or catch of any specific ship, vessel, craft or boat.
5. Every licensed exporter of codfish shall report to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries on the last day of every month, or within 48 hours thereafter, stating the quantity and quality of all fish then held in store by such exporter. The said report shall be verified by affidavit, and the said Minister shall not publish or allow any person whatsoever (except in pursuance of legal process) to have access to any such report; but the sum total of the quantities and qualities so reported shall be intimated by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to the President of the Newfoundland Board of Trade for the information and use of the Trade generally.
6. If any such exporter shall fail to report as hereinbefore provided, or shall knowingly make any false or incorrect report, he shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding \$1,000.00, which may be recovered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magistrate, or in default of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months.
7. If any person publishes, writes or disseminates any false information or statistics respecting the quantity of codfish caught or held in store, or otherwise in Newfoundland or exported, he shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars or imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month for each offence.
8. All penalties recovered under this Chapter shall be paid to the Minister of Finance and Customs for the use of the Colony.
9. Any person aggrieved by any conviction under this Act may appeal to the next Session of the Supreme Court in St. John's or on Circuit upon giving notice within fourteen days of his intention so to appeal.
10. This Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Codfish Report Act, 1920."
