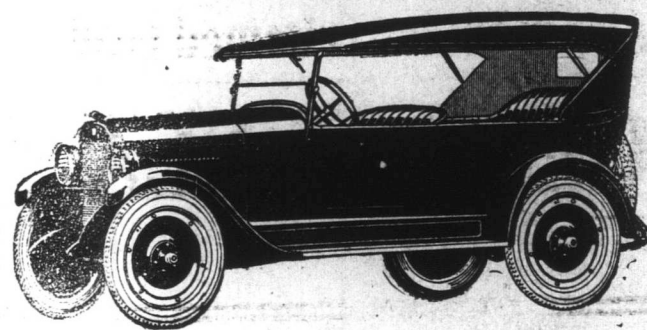

BRITAIN MAKES MAGNANIMOUS SETTLEMENT OFFER.

BRITAIN'S MAGNANIMOUS OFFER.

LONDON, Aug. 1.

The British Government cannot
treat repayment of the Anglo-Ameri-
can loan as if it were an isolated in-
cident in which only the United States
and Great Britain have any concern.

sees a note addressed to-day by the
Earl of Balfour, Acting Foreign Sec-
retary to France, Italy, Yugo Slavia,

Rumania, Portugal and Greece. This
transaction, continues the note, is but
one of a connected series, in which
Great Britain's appears sometimes as
debtor and sometimes as creditor. If,
it says, Great Britain's undoubted ob-
ligations as debtor are to be enforced,
her not less undoubted rights as
creditor cannot be left wholly in abey-
ance. Declaring that it is regretful-
ly constrained to request the French
Government to make arrangements
for dealing with the best of its ability
with the Anglo-French loan, the Brit-
ish Government says it desires to ex-
plain that the amount of interest and
the repayment which it asks, de-
pends less on what France and other
Allies owe Great Britain, than on
what Great Britain has to pay the United
States. The policy favored by
His Majesty's Government the note
states is that of surrendering Great
Britain's share of the German repar-
ations and writing off, through one
great transaction, the whole body of
inter-Allied indebtedness. But if this
is possible of accomplishment, the
note says, we wish it to be understood
we do not in any way desire to make
profit out of any less satisfactory ar-
rangement. In no circumstances do
we propose to ask more from debtors
than is necessary to pay our creditors,
and while we do not ask more all will
admit that we can hardly be content
with less, for it should not be forgot-
ten, though it sometimes is, that our
liabilities were incurred for others,
not for ourselves. Pointing out, in
conclusion, that it is not merely a
question between the Allies, because
former enemy countries also are in-
volved, and the great debtor is Ger-
many. The note declares that the
Government does not suggest, either
as a matter of justice or of expedi-
ency, that Germany should be relieved
of her obligations to other Allied
states, but Great Britain would be pre-
pared, subject to just claims of other
parts of the Empire, to abandon all
further rights to German reparations
and all claims to repayment by Allies
provided that this renunciation form
part of a general plan whereby this
great problem could be dealt with as
a whole, and a satisfactory solution
found. A general settlement in the
view of the British Government would
be of more value to mankind than any
gains could accrue even from the most
successful enforcement of legal obli-
gations.

long letter from him that he was
neither guilty nor conscious of fraud,
and stating he had been the victim of
an appalling error of justice, the vote
was taken.

U.S. TAKING OVER MILLION TONS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.

More than one million tons of coal
will be enroute to the United States
from England and Wales by Septem-
ber 1. Chartered have been left for
fifty ships aggregating four hundred
thousand tons to handle these im-
portations.

ONE DROWNED.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1.

Four hundred passengers were
taken off the stranded river steamer
Rapids Prince, on the rocks at La-
chine, since Sunday, when a lifeboat
worked by wireless from the steamer's
deck, made forty trips through the
rapids. Charles Ross, head waiter on
the steamer, was drowned when the
lifeboat capsized during a return
trip to the steamer. There were no
other casualties.

ITALY'S NEW PREMIER.

ROME, Aug. 1.

Luigi de Fasta, former Italian Pre-
mier, has succeeded in forming a new
Cabinet.

WOULD PREVENT EXPORT OF COAL.

CARDIFF, Aug. 1.

Council of the South Wales Miners'
Federation, approved a resolution
from the Rhondda District in favour
of preventing the export of coal to
America, and the matter has been
referred to the International Com-
mittee.

WHERE THE BLAME RESTS.

LONDON, Aug. 1.

It is reported the British Govern-
ment will send a circular note to the

Allies with reference to war debts
placing the responsibility upon the
United States for England's inability
to cancel or treat indulgently the
debts owed this country by her Euro-
pean allies.

PEERS AGREE.

LONDON, Aug. 1.

After a four days' debate the Peers
have agreed to consider the Govern-
ment's resolution for reform of the
House of Lords. The discussion will
be resumed in the Autumn session.

REFUSE SENIORITY RIGHTS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.

The railway executives of the na-
tion, to-day, firmly but courteously
rejected the programme advanced by
the Harding Administration for set-
tlement of the railway strike. Willing
to accept conditionally suggestions
put forward by the White House that
both sides abide by the wage deci-
sions of the Railroad Labor Board and
that law suits arising out of the
strike be withdrawn, the heads of
one hundred and forty-eight roads
declared emphatically that it was im-
possible to reinstate strikers with un-
impaired seniority rights, the third
provision of the President's plan.

WILL ACCEPT PEACE PLAN.

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.

Acceptance of President Harding's
peace plan by striking shipmen was
practically assured to-night.

BOLAND DIES FROM WOUNDS.

DUBLIN, Aug. 2.

Harry J. Boland, former repre-
sentative of Sinn Fein in the United
States, died to-night here of wounds
received early on Monday morning in
the Grand Hotel in Skeery, a fishing
village north of Dublin, while at-
tempting to evade capture by troops
of the National Army.

POINCARÉ'S ULTIMATUM.

PARIS, Aug. 2.

Premier Poincaré to-day in a note
to Herr Von Hoesch, German Charge
d'Affaires, summarily ended the ef-
forts of Germany to postpone pay-
ments of debts to French citizens
contracted by Germans before the
war. M. Poincaré's note gave the
Germans four days to make up their
minds. Should they fail to give assur-
ance before noon on August 5th that
two million pounds due will be paid
on August 15th. M. Poincaré asserts
that the French Government will take
such measures of compulsion as it
deems necessary.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.

Six people dead and hundreds are

Shelburn restaurant.

LONDON, Aug. 2.

WHERE GENERAL CONFERENCE MEETS.

TORONTO, Aug. 2.

The General Conference of the
Methodist Church in Canada, which
meets here in September, will deal
mainly with the memorial submit-
ted by the London Conference calling
for a revision of the Methodist Church
discipline. It is urged that a general
committee be appointed for this work,
the object being control and operation
of the Church.
