As a result of his experience, Captain Kennedy was known thereafter throughout the length and breadth of this country as the "Human Sieve." No one will dispute his right to the honourably earned title. Here also Lieutenant James Mason, now Colonel Mason, President and General Manager of the Home Bank, sustained severe wounds and earned his D.S.O. And here, also, though earlier in the day, Captain Arnold of Winnipeg received a mortal wound; and many another gallant

### ON MAJUBA DAY.

The charge was delivered around five o'clock, and it was the last effort of that initial day's fighting. The rest of the story does not belong here—the stealthy, inexorable advance by trenching, the steady, but largely bloodless by the artillery, the final assault by the Canadian Regiment which forced Cronje to his stubborn knees on the anniversary of Majuba, and forever wiped out that stain on British arms. Time has thinned the ranks of those whose baptism of fire dates back to the far-off days around Cronje's laager on the tree-fringed banks of the Modder. Some set forth in the last great adventure in the ields of Flanders and never returned. others have answered the summons of the Last Post in their own homes and now sleep in the graves of a peaceful Canadian community. Still others have vanished from ken, and there is no record of their passing.
