

Last Night's Lecture

MR. J. G. HIGGINS, ADDRESSES THE R. I. S. ON THE GLORIES OF IRELAND.

A large gathering in the Club Rooms of the Benevolent Irish Society listened with intense interest last night to a lecture on "The Glories of Ireland" by Mr. J. G. Higgins.

The lecturer showed that a high state of civilization existed in ancient Ireland. Centuries before the Christian era Ireland was divided into five kingdoms and in this classification men of learning were ranked next to royalty.

states that were founded at the time and could boast of from two to seven thousand students, all of whom were educated free.

A short account of the part played by music in ancient Ireland was given. Great schools for the teaching of music were set up and thousands from all parts of the world flocked to Ireland to study music.

He explained that no great ruined piles show the civilization that existed in pre-Christian Ireland in the same way as the greatness of Ancient Greece and of Rome are shown by their magnificent ruins.

Previous to the address there was a short concert in which Misses Howlett, Harris and Mr. Canning took part. At the conclusion a vote of thanks to the lecturer and to those who had contributed to the pleasure of the evening was moved by Mr. Geo. F. Power and carried unanimously.

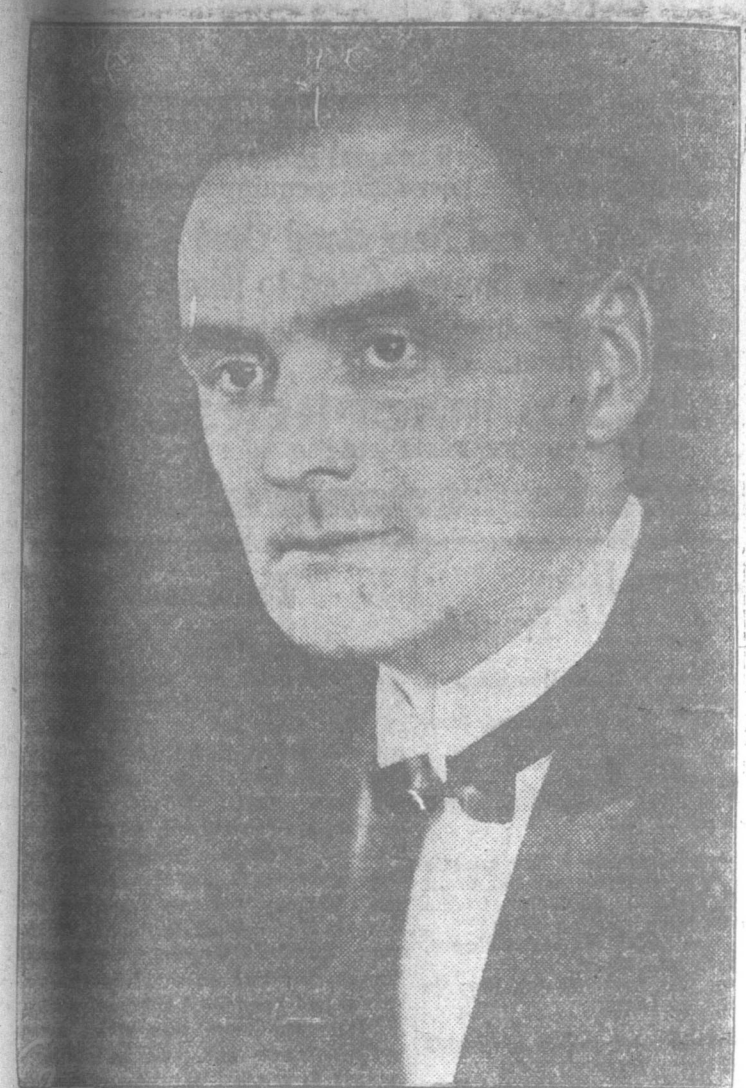
