25,000 Pounds Award

DAMAGES TO KENT FARMER DIVIDED BETWEEN TWO DOCTORS.

Judgment for £25,000—the full damages awarded by the jury—was given by Mr. Justice Lush in the case in which Mr. W. S. Harnett, a fruit grower of Newington, near Sittingbourne (Kent), sued two doctors for wrongful detention in mental homes.

Dr. C. H. Bond, a Commissioner in Lunacy, of Victoria-street, S.W., and Dr. G. H. Adam, of West Malling (Kent), was ordered to pay £20,000 jointly with costs, and Dr. Bond a further £5,000 with costs.

In their original finding the jury divided the damages into £17,500 against Dr. Bond and £7,500 against Dr. Adam.

The Judge granted a stay of execution pending consideration of an appeal to Dr. Bond on condition that he paid £5,000 down to Mr. Harnett within a week, paid the balance of £20,000 in court, or gave security in three weeks, paid the costs on the usual undertaking, and entered an appeal within a month.

Mr. A. Neilson's application for a stay of execution for Dr. Adam was adjourned for a week in order that the Judge might have an assurance regarding the fulfillment of the conditions imposed upon Dr. Bond. In the meantime, Dr. Adam was granted a stay of execution.

Mr. Harnett was originally sent to Dr. Adam's home on November 10, 1912, after being duly certified, and was allowed out on twenty-eight days' probation on December 12, 1912.

On December 14, 1912, when he visited the offices of the Commissioners in Lunacy, he was detained by Dr. Bond, afterwards being taken back to Dr. Adam's home.

There he was detained until February 22, 1913. He was afterwards transferred to various homes, and spent over eight years under control, until in October, 1921, he escaped.

A King's Bench Division jury found that Mr. Harnett was sane on December 14, 1912.

GRAVE WANT OF CARE.

Mr. Justice Lush, in giving judgment, said the true view to take of the question of "romanticness of damages" was that the detention during the whole period was the direct consequence, following in an unbroken chain, of the wrongful sending of Mr. Harnett back by Dr. Bond and the wrongful assistance given by Dr. Adam in accomplishing that purpose.

"Dr. Adam," said the Judge, "was guilty of a grave want of care in at once agreeing that Dr. Bond should imprison Mr. Harnett and to assist him in making that imprisonment complete. Dr. Adam did nothing to assist Mr. Harnett."

"He did nothing to ascertain that he was really insane which we know in truth he was not."

"Of all persons the unfortunate and helpless persons who have been certificated as insane require every care from those in charge. They are powerless to resist the acts of officials who administer the lunacy laws."
