The new street lighting system of St.
Thomas is completed, and Sir Adam
Beck on Tuesday night pushed the but-
ton, which transformed a mile of Tal-
bot st. into a great white way, and too
clearly showed up the bumpy pavement.
The light put on is equal to 75,612 can-
dle power as compared with the old
system of 6,670. The cost will be about
\$16,000, and is borne by the hydro elec-
tric department. Almost immediately
after turning on the lights, Sir Adam
left for New York, from which port he
sails for England. He will look into
the remount problems from the battle
fields of France in order to obtain more
definite information as to the require-
ments. Since he has been at the head
of the remount commission, Sir Adam
has purchased several thousands of
horses, most of them now in France.

A most distressing accident, result-
ing in the death of one of the victims,
the serious injury of another and a terrible
shock to a third, happened on the 5th
con. of Malahide about 5.30 Sunday af-
ternoon. The Misses Bears, Sarah,
Sophronia and Julia, had been spending
the afternoon at the home of Will Sum-
mers, and were on their way home,
they found an automobile approaching
and another following their rig. Their
horse being rather timid of autos, the
three ladies decided to turn into the
gateway of Charles Lanyon, but in their
nervousness made too short a turn, and
the buggy collided with a gatepost,
throwing the occupants out. Miss Sa-
rah came into contact with the post
with such force that her skull was frac-
tured, a splinter entering the thin part
of her skull to a depth of one and a half
inches. Her right arm was also broken.
No hope whatever was entertained of
her recovery, and she passed away at 3
o'clock yesterday morning, without
having regained consciousness. Miss So-
phronia had her lip cut so badly that it
lay over on her cheek, there was also a
bad cut over the eye, and other minor
injuries. It is expected that she will
recover. The third sister, Miss Eliza,
received a bad shaking up and is pro-
trated from the shock. The sad ac-
cident has cast a gloom over the commu-
nity where the ladies lived and are so
highly respected. They were daughters
of the late Benjamin Bears, and sisters
of the late Wilson Bears, who was only
buried last week. The funeral of Sarah
Bears, who was in her 67th year, will
take place from her late residence at 2
o'clock on Friday, to the Aylmer ceme-
tery.
