This is due to the fact that raw materials have remained high when compared with other periods of decreasing trade. Coal continue to be maintained on a high level. This is partly due to the good wages paid collier whose power of combining prevents the lowering of wages, restricts the output and thus maintains prices.

Owing to the depression in the iron trade operations at many of the principal iron works in the Cumberland (Eng.) district have been suspended for some time, and the inability of workmen to procure employment is causing the most acute distress. Six thousand men have been thrown out of employment by the stoppage of the works.
