REFORM OF THE LORDS.

London, Sept. 29.—Reform of the House of Lords has, in the last two days, become a topic of principal discussion. While nothing may come of it immediately or in the near future, the vigor with which the subject is being handled in the press and in the public addresses indicates that the lever is working which will ultmately give the House of Lords at least some semblance of a representative character. The speech of the Marquis of Londonderry at a banquet in Ripon on Friday night, in which he admitted that the House of Lords is susceptible of improvement, and expressed the hope that the Unionists would grapple with the question, is heartily welcomed by the Unionist press, and appears to confirm the statement published in the Daily Chronicle, that the Conservative leaders meditate introducing a measure for the reform of the House of Lords. It is suggested, however, that there is a possibility that this is another scheme emanating from the circles dominated by the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, with a view to further "dishing" the Radicals. 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
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
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
