SHADOWING SOCIALISTS. The Berlin police have found a new way to look after the dreaded Socialists. Policemen in citizens' clothes are sent to all places of public resort frequented by malcontents and the lower classes generally. They are allowed a certain sum to pay for drinks and food, and all they have to do is to keep their ears and eyes open and to make arrests for seditious utterances. A new police order provides for the arrest of persons who after 11 o'clock at night play the piano or sing with open windows. The regulation is now in force in the suburbs, and if found applicable will be introduced in the capital.


