Reply to Chamberlain Anent Baden-Powell, commanding the Fifth Dragoon Guards, has issued a notice the Outlanders' Petitions.

Interesting Statements in "Green Book."

The British Camp at Mafeking Twice Called to Arms.

Natal Dispatch States That the Boars Are Leaving Camp and Returning to Their Homes.

London, Oct. 9.-A green book, just issued, contains President Kruger's reply to Mr. Chamberlain's dispatch referring to the petition of the outlanders.

The Transvaal objects to Great Britain's interference in its internal affairs and explains that, if the outlanders had first addressed the Transvaal, instead of the British Government, their complaints would have been immediately heeded. It also alleges that those complaints emanated wholly from a "small body of British who are breeding race hatred and a revolutionary movement, and whose membership and newspapers openly boast of the influence exercised by them upon the policy of the imperial government.

The reply adds: "The Transvaal is bound to credit these boasts when it sees blue books issued consisting of documents drawn up by these revolu-tionary members of the South African League and of lying articles and reports from newspapers which are the organs of the league. If the real character of the league could be known, it would soon lose its influence and the tension between the two governments

would speedily disappear.

The reply concludes as follows: "The Afrikanders would then no longer fear that the interests of the British em-pire necessarily destroyed the destruc-tion of the two republics, and the enslavement of the Afrikander popula-tion; and the white races in South Africa would return to the brotherly harmony that had set in until a treacherous complot, at the end of 1895, revived passion on both sides."

EXODUS OF CAPE DUTCHMEN. The exodus of Cape Dutchmen towards the Transvaal continues. seem to be smuggling arms across the frontier. The report of Harry Escombe's mission of peace to Pretoria statesman went, instead, to Newcastle, with a view of quieting the alarm of his friends. Rumors are current there that Commandant-General Joubert's return to Pretoria was occasioned by a petition of the Boers to have Commandant Viljoen made commander-in-

Advices from Pretoria say that the Transvaal Government has received a dispatch from the United States secretary of state, Col. John Hay, to the effect that as Gen. James R. O'Beirne, recently designated by President Kruger to represent the Transvaal in the United States, is an American, he cannot hold a diplomatic appointment from the South African Republic in the United States. State Secretary Reitz, therefore, has asked Mr. Bosman to remain, and full powers will be given him to act on behalf of the Transvaal in the interests of peace. Pretoria, the dispatches say, presents a most deserted appearance. The government has ordered all the saloons

closed throughout the republic. TALES OF HORROR. The Evening News publishes the following dispatch from Cape Town:
"The reports of the barbaric excesses committed by the Boers on refugees have caused a thrill of horror here. In one instance 70 women and children were packed in a cattle truck so tightly that they were unable to sit, and were thus kept sidetracked for 30 hours without food or water. When they attempted to leave the truck they were driven back with blows.

"Every train load of refugees brings harrowing accounts of the barbarities of the Boers of the Orange Free State. done as they threatened, and abandoned the idea of fighting. A train arrived today that had been 96 hours en route. The sufferings of the women were dreadful. Several births occurred on the way—one in an open cattle truck containing 20 men. HUSTLING.

Every department of the government is as busy as though actual hos-ulities had begun. The electric flash that announced the mobilization of the army reserves and the summaning of parliament set every wheel in motion. An hour after the Gazette appeared, executive orders were being dispatched from the war office to every section of the kingdom, and the 10,000 bulletins which appeared posted throughout the country are said to have been identical with the proclamation prepared for use had the Fashoda incident required such a step. At the same time Lord Salisbury and Mr. Balfour were issuing the necessary orders for the re-assembling of parliament, the admiralty was concentrating its transports, 24 of which are now secured at Liverpool alone. So complete were the preparations that 25,000 reserves have already individually received coupon tickets, which contain instructions where each man shall report for transportation to the place designated, and a money order for three shillings for provision en route. At Woolwich it is asserted that 95 per cent of the reserves will be fully equipped within

TWO ALARMS. Twice on Sunday the British camp at Mafeking was aroused. The men stood to their arms, guns were limbered and patrols were dispatched in the direction of the border. No hostili-ties have occurred as yet, but the enemy have moved practically to the border, eight miles from Mafeking, in force 6,000 strong, comprising five commands. The garrisoning and fortifying of the towns is practically completed. The streets are barricaded, and a perfect system of mines have been laid. Two armored trains have Two armored trains have arrived laid. Two armored trains have arrived at Mafeking, consisting of three bulletproof cars, the first of which carries a searchlight, while the sides of the cars are loopholed. Experiments with lyddite in the mines have proved that it is an extremely high explosive. Col.

The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail declares that the story of a Boer ultimatum, demanding withrawal of the British troops from the frontiers, had been issued, is without foundation; but he says the republics have within the past week demanded a declaration of the British intentions in threatening terms. Hostilities in outlying districts, the correspondent says, are expected this week, and he adds: "The financial position of the Free State is becoming acute, and the suspension of specie payments is expected soon."

Death of Mr. George Smith. Pioneer Banker of Chicago and the Northwest.

London, Oct. 9.-The body of Mr. Geo. Smith, the pioneer banker of Chicago and the Northwest, who died on Saturday at the Reform Club, London, will be interred tomorrow at Elgin, where he once resided. Mr. James Smith, his nephew and heir presumptive, now in New York city, has been cabled to come to London immediately.

Chicago, Oct. 9 .- George A. Smith,

worth \$20,000,000, who died at the Reform Club, London, Saturday, was a Chicago banker in 1834. A year before he had left Aberdeen, Scotland, with a few thousand dollars, and landed at New York. He did not like the place, and traveled by canal to Buffalo, where spent the winter. He went from Buffalo to Detroit, and then came by stage to Chicago, where he opened a He prospered, and in a short time induced the late Alexander Mit-chell, afterwards for many years president of the Milwaukee and St. Paul road, to come to this country from Scotland. Smith sent Mitchell to Milwaukee to look after his real estate interest there, the association continuing for many years. Former United States Senator C. B. Farwell was cashier in Smith's Chicago bank, which was the first legitimately conducted bank in Chicago and the west. The dead banker's heirs are all in England and Scot
