CAPITAL ECHOES

Rebate of Duty on Ottawa-Hull Donations-Yukon Field Force To Be Bankers' Association.

Special to The Advertiser per C.P.R.] Ottawa, May 16 .- An order in council has been passed providing to give a rebate on duty on all donations sent to Ottawa and Hull in aid of the fire sufferers. This will last for two The government has decided to

withdraw the Yukon field force. They will leave Dawson and Selkirk as soon as navigation opens. The peace and order of the district will for the future be attended to by the Mounted Police. A bill to incorporate the Canadian Bankers' Association was discussed at the banking and commerce committee today. The object of the bill is to promote the interest and efficiency of banks and bank officers, to properly qualify, and to train all persons who enter into the employment of banks to arrange for lectures on commercial law and banking, and to publish the journal of the Canadian Bankers' Association. Thirty-four banks have already joined the association, Mr. Bor-den (Halifax) opposed the bill on behalf of the Bank of Nova Scotia, which objects to the clause providing that the association may establish and conduct in any place in Canada clear-ing houses for banks. This power Mr. Borden thought should not be delegat ed by parliament to the banks. S. H. Blake, Q.C., who represented the banks, said that uniformity in the regulations and conduct of clearing houses was what was aimed at, and no injustice would be done to any bank. The bill was passed with a few unimportant
