CONTRACTORS ARE HAVING DIFFICULTY

Cement on Springbank Dam Must Be Roughened to Admit of Progress-

To the board of water commissioners, which met yesterday afternoon, Engineer More stated that the contractor at Springbank dam was meeting with much difficulty. Only the plaster face of the dam is being replaced-it was damaged by the heavy ice in the spring-and to do this the concrete must be roughened, an extremely hard thing to do, as it has become as hard as granite. It will take six days to complete the refacing. Engineer Moore recommended that a 4-inch main be laid on Mamelon street from the Hamilton road to Layard street, upon Hyatt Bros. signing an agreement to pay annual water rates to the amount of not less than \$10; estimated cost \$125. The engineer also

recommended that the 8-inch centrifugal pumps at Springbank he repaired; estimated cost \$35. A communication was received from the trustees of the First Congrega-tional Church, asking that the commissioners discontinue the service for the large organ and remove the meter, as they had decided to adopt their premethod of supplying power.

Filed. The trustees of the Aged People's Home applied for a second service pipe to supply one of the wings of the building. The secretary was instructed to advise them that the board would place the pipe as they desired to a dis-

tance of 20 feet free. Several complaints of one kind and another were referred to the engineer or secretary to report upon.
