## A FUTURE OF PROMISE

Our Era of Progress Has But Begun.

The Premier, Hon. George W. Ross, at Welland,

Gives an Able Exposition of the Forward Policy of the Government.

Welland, Nov. 26.-At a crowded and enthuisastic meeting of Liberals from all parts of this county yesterday af-ternoon, Hon. George W. Ross, premier of Ontario, delivered a stimulating and comprehensive address, setting forth the record and policy of his govern-ment, and appealing for a fair opportunity to bring to fruition its great plans for the building up of the prov-The meeting was held in the opera house immediately after the close of a thoroughly unanimous convention, at which Mr. J. F. Gross, M. P. P., was again chosen to lead the Liberals in

the fight.
The chair was occupied by Lieut. Cruickshanks, Fort Erie, who opened the meeting very briefly, calling at once on Mr. German, who complimented the party on the selection of Mr. Gross. He warned them against underrating the strength of Mr. Gross' opponents. The contest would involve the question whether the government of the province should be intrusted to Mr. Ross and his able government, or to Mr. Whitney and his somewhat erratic It was a matter of general knowledge that one of Mr. Whitney's chief supporters, Mr. Marter, had practically deserted Mr. Whitney, and Mr. Marter probably knew Mr. Whitney better than any other man. contrasted the strong forward policy of the government with Mr. Whitney's attempt to belittle new Ontario. THE MAN FROM LINCOLN. Mr. D. J. 
