MAY BARKER, TIRED OF LIFE,

MAKES ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE

The second unsuccessful attempt at suicide in as many days was made last evening, within a short distance of where the dead body of Mrs. Tilson was found floating on Friday morning.

May Barker, the 18-year-old daughter of Mr. Wm. H. Barker, 14 Bruce street, was found in the water at the entrance to the cove ranges, a few blocks from home, and was rescued.

The young woman had stated to some of the members of the family last night that she intended to drown herself, but naturally they did not pay much attention to this. However, she went away about 7 o'clock, and the mother and sister, becoming alarmed, went in search of her. Coming along the top of the hill Mrs. Barker saw the body of her daughter in the water and raised an alarm. Mr. John Quirk ran to her assistance and brought out the body, seemingly lifeless.

Policemen Probyn and Monaghan were soon on the scene. The former had been present in the morning when Mrs. Tilson was brought from the water.

The girl intended to suicide there is no doubt. Her father has an idea that she fell into the water while in a fit, to which she was subject. However, the fact that she said she was going to take her own life goes to show that she desired to do away with herself. The girl had of late been somewhat wayward, and her father, who is most respectable, did everything they could for her. Not long ago she was arrested with a couple of other girls, and the magistrate was lenient with her. She promised to do better, and doubtless she was sincere at the time. Her father, too, assured the magistrate that he would keep a better watch upon her. It was not difficult for her to fall back into the old ways, however, and she had to be removed by her parents. Probably, full of remorse and despondent over her outlook, she decided to end her life as she tried last night. Earlier in the evening, it is said, she was reprimanded by her father for conduct of late.

GAS COMPANY ACCUSES WAS A ZEALOUS WORKER

Citizen in Court Charged With Stealing Gas.

The first case wherein a citizen was charged with stealing gas from the City Gas Company came up at police court this morning. George McGregor, who keeps a barber shop on Richmond street, was the man against whom Mr. Charles Forbes, manager of the company, laid the charge. As neither side was quite prepared to proceed the case was adjourned until Tuesday. Mr. McGregor being bailed to appear.

It is alleged that the accused unlawfully made connections with a service pipe, to which no meter was attached. The company says it was not supplying the store with gas.

The man who appeared a week ago for assaulting his wife, who runs a garage in South London, was allowed to go, the two having settled their differences in the week.

Isaac Hannah told the magistrate that he was confident that his sons would make money for him in Toronto, and he was allowed to go.

London, Aug. 1.—A supplementary estimate issued this morning grants an additional \$250,000 for the aid of the royal commission to the St. Louis Exposition for the period ending March 31, 1904. An explanatory note says all further contributions will be provided in the budgets of subsequent years.

The Woodstock Sentinel-Review refers to the late Dean of Huron in these terms: "The news of the sudden death of Dean Innes, of London, will cause deep sorrow among his many friends in this city. He was a frequent visitor here, and when he occupied one of the Woodstock pulpits was heard with deep pleasure. He made no pretensions to oratory, but his words always impressed the congregation he was addressing as those of a simple, devout Christian, who never failed to carry his religion into his life, and of a man whose character had been moulded by a rich experience. Like the late Canon Bettridge, of Woodstock, Dean Innes began life as a soldier, retiring to enter the ministry over forty years ago. His familiar figure will be much missed from the streets of London and from the various gatherings of the church in the diocese."

The death of Rev. Dean Innes brought to the executive committee of the Western Ontario Bible Society together in special session yesterday. Dean Innes had for many years been a leading member of the society, occupying the office of senior vice-president this year, and it was felt that an appropriate resolution should be passed by the committee, and forwarded to the family of the deceased. The resolution was as follows: "The Western Ontario Bible Society have heard with profound regret of the sudden death of the Very Rev. Dean Innes, on Wednesday, July 29. As senior vice-president of the Western Ontario Bible Society, he had taken the most thoughtful and zealous interest in the work, and his kind presence at the meetings of the executive was ever welcome and strengthening. During the present year, he manifested his interest by journeying to Montreal to assist in completing arrangements for the world-wide celebration of the centennial of the British and Foreign Bible Society."

Thousands Have Gone to Lake With Travelers.

The travelers have a great day for their picnic. It dawned without a cloud in the sky, and up to the time of the parade this morning the weather conditions were favorable.

The 6 o'clock train to Port Stanley took down Mr. Harry Buttery and an advance guard of the Travelers' Club, who have been attending to a few matters necessary left until today. About 10 o'clock the knights of the Grot began to gather at the Masonic Temple, and at half past a large procession was formed which paraded around several streets and down Dundas and Richmond to the Grand Trunk station. The parade was headed by the full band of the Seventh Regiment, with Sergeant Cockburn as drum major. They marched double file and in their white hats and duck trousers made an attractive appearance. Mr. W. H. Escott was chief marshal, and his assistants were Messrs. J. R. Sprule and S. H. Scriver.

Hundreds of citizens went down this morning, and with trains every half hour, the number of picnickers will run into the thousands.

At a meeting of the Irish Benevolent Society on Friday, the visit of the King and Queen to Ireland was commented upon, and a motion was unanimously passed to the effect that a message be forwarded to the King and Queen expressing the gratitude of the society to their majesties for their kindness to Ireland, and the hope that their visit might result in bringing happiness and prosperity to the country in the future. The matter was introduced by Mr. John Stevely, whose idea was that it would be a fitting thing for the society to put itself on record in regard to their majesties' visit to Ireland. Enthusiasm marked the reception of the motion, the National Anthem being heartily sung.
