That has gone for good, and it went for the excellent reason that the public had had enough of it. It had its day like other kinds of amusement, and it is a fact of that business that nothing is ever revived to repeat its first success.

"I don't think that there is any particular cause for regret in the disappearance of negro minstrelsy, for it was not an especially high form of dramatic art. But it is always a surprise to me that so many persons who have the time to deplore the disappearance of negro minstrelsy never realize why it happened."
