What is wanted is that the funds received in premiums shall be carefully and safely invested, so that when the policy matures the funds will be forth- coming to meet it. The tables of mor- tality are carefully worked out; the element of expense varies; the rates of interest obtainable vary also, but these must be reckoned with.

The New York Sun flatly states: "In general it may be rudely stated that the insurance officers blackmail the insurance companies or the insurance companies own the insurance officers. Here in this state the best opinion is that the latter practice has prevailed, and that the whole legisla- tive relation of the state to insurance has been practically controlled by the companies. The law has been framed at their dictation and has been ad- ministered at their discretion."

Notwithstanding this and its state- ment that "immunity is a commodity, and the price is as well known as the price of wheat," it does not favor federal control. It places its trust in public opinion and publicity.

In all over twelve tenders were re- ceived, and the work of opening and classifying them was immediately be- gun. This will take a couple of days, when the definite announcement of the result will be given. Nearly a dozen companies have their representatives in the city, hailing from Minnesota, Chi- cago, Western Canada, as well as the Eastern States and Montreal.

Farm Laborers' Excursions 1905.

Latest advices from Winnipeg state that the wheat crop of Manitoba and the Canadian Northwest will exceed all previous seasons; a great number of eastern laborers will be required to assist at harvesting. Farm Laborers' Excursion will be run from points:

GOING DATES.

AUGUST 23, 1905-Stations south of, but not including, main line Toronto to Sarnia.

SEPTEMBER 2, 1905-Main line Tor- onto to Sarnia and stations north- west of north of Cardwell Junction and Toronto on North Bay Section.

SEPTEMBER 4, 1905-From all points Toronto and east to and including Sharbot, Lake, and Kingston, and north of Toronto and Cardwell Junction on North Bay and Midland Divi- sions.

Tickets will be sold to female as well as to male laborers. Tickets will not be sold at half rate to children.

With each ticket the purchaser will be given a Farm Laborers' Verification Certificate, and an extension coupon.

At Winnipeg the special trains will be met by farmers, and by representatives of the Manitoba Government, Laborers may engage with them at Winnipeg, and on presentation of extension cou- pon, signed by a farmer stating that the holder has engaged to work as a farm laborer, ticket agent will issue free ticket from Winnipeg to C. P. R. station nearest the point where he has engaged to work, and on arrival at such station he must deposit the Farm Laborers' Verification Certificate with the C. P. R. agent. If anyone has made prior arrangement to work with friends, or with some farmer with whom they worked previously, they will be issued free ticket as above, and may check their baggage through- out starting point to C. P. R. station nearest the point of work. Provided such point is not beyond Moosejaw, Sheho, Lipton, Prince Albert or Estevan, as free tickets will not be issued, nor baggage checked to points beyond these stations.

After a laborer has worked for at least thirty days, and has certifi- cate signed by the farmer with whom he has worked, such certificate will be honored prior to Nov. 30th for a ticket to return to starting point, by the same as on going journey on

ling some thousands of pieces of bag- gage at one station. Therefore, when possible, baggage should be carried in hand grips, and these passengers should take in the cars with them. It is expected that special passenger trains (particulars to be announced later) for the accommodation of la- borers will be run on the main lines, and tickets will not be accepted on regular trains.
