SAYS SCIENCE PROVES THERE'S AN AFTER LIFE

Dr. Guthe Says That Personality Spirit, Goes on Developing Despite Death.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 10.—"If you claim that personality is both matter and mind, both physical energy and consciousness, are we not completely destroyed when death claims our bodies?" is the question Dr. Carl E. Guthe, professor of physics, answered in lecturing to students of the University of Michigan on the probability of life after death without reference to a religious

But even the matter and energy which has been given off from the living body has not disappeared, it is still in existence though disconnected from the life-giving principle. Should we not demand that there should be a similar conservation for the invisible part of our life?

Admits Limit on Vision.


