Kansas Cyclone Sprung On Wise Ones On Grand Circuit Yesterday—Grey Ghost an Easy Victim Gets Second and Third Places---Dr. F. L. Wood's Fair Hazel Starts in 2:14 Trot---Henry Winters Fourth in 2:20 Trot.

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 22.-A Kansas cyclone drifted into this city during the week and this afternoon proceeded to tear things up at Comstock Park, causing sundry supposedly wise people great annoyance and likewise putting a serious crimp in their bank rolls.

This was the bay gelding Giftline, who gave the best field of 2:03 pacers which has come together in many moons the beating of their lives, pacing the two fastest heats in a race this season, and also lowering the track record which this same pacer set last year at 2:03% a full second.

It was the hardest jolt which the talent had received at the meeting, and some of the shrewdest speculators who follow the grand circuit were on the wrong end of the play.

The Eel, Favorite.

The Canadian champion, The Eel, was the best liked in the betting, and the wise ones nearly all wanted to get aboard. A few, however, heard how the horse from Kansas had been burning up the track in his work at Indianapolis and they grabbed off the cheap tickets so eagerly that Giftline was soon an equal choice with The Eel. Giftline was off in front in the first heat, and none of the field were able to get near him, he winning as he pleased in 2:02%. The second heat they were out to beat him and Ross K. rushed out

in front at the word and led at the half in 1:00 1/2, with Darkey Hal second and Giftline third.

A Great Finish.

Here the latter commenced to move up and at the head of the stretch had the pair beaten. Then Cox commenced a furious drive with Aileen He had a lot of ground to make up, but the black mare fairly fled the stretch and Giftline just lasted long enough to get the decision by an eyelash in 2:031/4;

Aside from the fast pace the star race of the day was the 2:14 trot, which the European-bred trotter, owned by Louis Winans, of Hove, England, was the favorite.

Winans' Horse Wins.

The handsome little trotter went out in front at the start and won all the way in 2:0814, being the first foreign trotter to win over an American srack. Then the half-mile track trotter Hailworthy took up the fight and outfinished Willy in 2:09½. The third heat found the gray trotter, Bobbie B. McGregor, in front at the wire. A little quiet advice from Presiding-Judge Keating to the driver of Hailworthy caused that worthy in the fourth heat, which he won in a driving finish with Willy in 2:071/4, the fastest heat trotted in a race this year and within one-half second of the world's record for a fourth heat.

Hailworthy a Good One.

The fifth heat was rather easy for Hailworthy, who looks to be the best of the new trotters, not excepting Dudie Archdale. Four good colts started in the three-year-old trot, which was easy for Colorado E., driven by Raney Macey, with Lulu Arion, also driven by a boy driver, Jimmy Benyon, second. The stake for 2:20 trotters was a long, Tawn-out affair, going the limit of five heats, and was finally won by Henry L., Charley Dean's M. and M. candidate, with Rickey Rawson, also an M. and M. nominee, second. Tom Murphy showed up a likely pacing mare in May Day, who landed the 2:12 pace from a big field in straight heats, taking a record of 2:06%.
