HUMAN SKELETONS IN CALIFORNIA CAVES

Early Natives of Commonwealth.

Berkeley, Cal., Sept 2.-During the convention of the Paleontological Society at the University of California everal interesting papers were read on excavations of California kaves, showing that human bones had been discovered in several of them. One of the best known authorities on such matters is Professor J. C. Merriman. During the course of investigations within the last five or six years many interesting discoveries have marked the efforts of Professor Merriman and former is authority for the statement that in no instance, however, have any specimens been discovered which can be said to be of quaternary age, buried during the present period.

In referring to the occurrence

numan remains in Mercer's cave in Calaveras County, and in the Stone Man Cave in Shasta County, Professor Merriman says they were discovered under conditions which certainly suggest a considerable antiquity. "In skeletal remains were found in proximity to the bones of a quaternary ground-sloth," says this authority.
"The bones of both sloth and man were incrusted with a deposit of talagamite, the incrustation on the sloth bones being considerably thick-er than that on the human remains, nd it is not probable that they were ouried at the same time."
"The remains in Stone Man Cave

were discovered in a remote gallery of this extensive cavern. The greater number of the bones were imbedded a layer of stalagamite, which enveloped them to the thickness of one-eighth of an inch or more. A vertebra which was obtained many rears ago from this locality is found to have lost most of the organic material and the cavities are largely filled with calcite crystals. Dr. Hawver, for whom Hawver Cave derives its name, made the statement that during his explorations of that cavern he found a number of human bones twenty feet below the surface under a mass of cave earth, fallen rock and soil over twelve feet in thickness

MEANS TO REFORM GERMAN MANNERS

Simplified Salutes for Men One Thing Proposed—Movement Strongly Opposed.

London, Aug. 31.-A movement for the reform of certain social usages is on foot in Germany. The reformers say that German manners are far too formal and ostentatious. They object particularly to the customary method exchanging salutations on the street. According to the unwritten law of the land two German gentlemen who are acquainted greet each other by removing the hat with a sweeping ceremonious gesture.

In Baden some days ago a society was organized especially to discourage this practice. The members are pledged to greet their men friends by simply touching the rim of the hat in a sort of military salute. How much opposition the reformers

will have to overcome if they are to be successful is shown by the case of an official of the finance ministry of Hesse-Darmstadt. As a loyal member of the society he declined to greet his superior official, the finance minister, in the customary fashion, and used the more democratic "German greet-ing" adopted by his fellow reformers.
