HELP FOR THE WESTERN IS VERY ROUNDABOUT!

\$10,000 Grant for the
Hygienic Institute Not
Exactly What Is
Wanted.

MORE MONEY
IS LOOKED FOR

It May Be That an Additional
Sum Will Be Included in
Next Estimates.

In the supplementary estimates brought down by the Provincial Treasurer in the last legislature, \$10,000 is set aside for the equipment of the Hygienic Institute on Osgoode street, this city. Whether or not this is the full extent of the assistance to be rendered to the students of the Western University, the question is not known, but the consensus of opinion among those interested in the problem of education is that a further sum will be granted to the Western when the estimates for 1911-12 are brought down.

According to the medical men who were interviewed today by The Advertiser the \$10,000 will be used in thoroughly equipping the Hygienic Institute.

This will include the science branches, chemistry and physics, biology and the like, to be used by the arts students of the Western University.

In addition there will be equipment for making milk tests, examining germ cultures, and the like, for the medical men of Western Ontario and the boards of health.

The Maintenance.

There will be an arrangement, it is understood, between the Government and the Western Medical School for the maintenance of the institute.

It will be remembered that when the matter was first broached, the Government set aside \$50,000 for the building and \$5,000 per annum for maintenance.

It was on the last question that negotiations were called off. The amount mentioned was considered inadequate for maintenance, and is still being discussed.

The medical men proposed a higher annual grant and this will likely be given. No question has been made of the amount to be set aside by the Government for annual maintenance, but it is expected within a short time.

The amount mentioned is given for equipment for the Hygienic Institute, a branch of the medical men. The Advertiser "You will notice that the \$10,000 for 1911-12 have not been brought down as yet, but will be later. The money for equipment comes out of last year's appropriations, and we are as much the gainer."

The Question Now.

The matter now being settled is that of the amount to be set aside for annual maintenance of the institute. It is proposed to hand over the institute to the medical faculty, if an agreement can be made as to the amount to be received annually for running the place. The sum first mentioned, \$5,000, is not adequate, and must be increased. If this is done, as is expected, it will be, they say, the first time that the Western Medical School will have a new building in close proximity to the Hygienic Institute, and we will have as much more as we need to carry on our work.

The grant just made is all right, but we are waiting to hear what happens when the estimates for 1911-12 are brought down.

The grant made will be sufficient to install the equipment at the Hygienic Institute, declared Dr. Vaughn, registrar of the medical faculty. "Chairs will be established there that will be of benefit to both the Medical School and the arts students. I think it is a fine thing. I do not know what grant will be made for the maintenance of the institute."

Some Dissatisfaction.

There is some dissatisfaction expressed, however, as it is now thought that the department of the Western will be somewhat neglected, that the money will go for medical education, and that the department of the Western proper will be somewhat neglected.

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GREAT MOVEMENT TOWARDS PEACE

Afternoon London Papers Enthusiastic Over Grey's Speech.

SUPPORTING TAFT'S PLAN

Held That British-United States Arbitration Pact Would Insure End of Strife.

London, March 14.—The afternoon papers welcome with enthusiasm the cordial support of President Taft's known wish for the signing of an arbitration treaty, given in the House of Commons last night by Sir Edward Grey. It is assumed that the American executive cherishes the hope that an amendment to the present prohibition in Article I against the submission to arbitration of questions of vital interest to the two parties involving their honor.

The foreign secretary referred to President Taft's recent arbitration speech as "bold, courageous and pregnant with consequences," and added that he believed that the British Government and Parliament would place the stamp of their approval upon the sentiments expressed.

A Natural Alliance.

The Evening Standard holds that a "real and natural alliance would be not that between England and France, or England and Japan, but between England and the United States."

"The Standard says, 'These two governments could agree that the armaments of one should be available to resist an attack upon the other, there could be no more danger from aggression, either in the Atlantic or Pacific regions.'"

The Pall Mall Gazette says that Sir Edward's response to President Taft's suggestion "carries with it the full strength of English feeling against war."

The Westminster Gazette expresses the hope that this great movement of English-speaking peoples toward peace will go forward and prosper.

SASKATCHEWAN PREMIER FOR FEDERAL CABINET

Reported at Regina That Mr. Scott Will Go to Ottawa Following Elections.

Regina, Sask., March 14.—There is no change in the Saskatchewan Liberal leadership, both sides refusing to concede the point about the new election lists. It is reported generally in political circles that a provincial election is shortly to be held, and that Premier Scott will then enter the Dominion cabinet.

INTERCOLONIAL MEN GET AN INCREASE

Agreement Reached Giving an Increase From Ten to Twenty Per Cent.

Moncton, N. B., March 14.—Following a conference between the Intercolonial Railway board of management and a committee of the Intercolonial Railway Trade Union, it is announced that an agreement making a 10 to 20 per cent increase in wages of certain classes of employees on the government railway system has been reached. More than nine hundred men will benefit, yard foremen, yard brakemen and freight employees, being the classes favorably affected.

LONDON DOCTOR IS OPPOSED TO TORONTO VARSITY CONTROL

Dr. Campbell Says Medical Affairs of the Province Are Much Suffered in Control of the Council—Comment on Medical Journal—Dr. Waugh's Opinion.

"Control of the medical affairs of the province by the Ontario Medical Council is very much preferable to control by Toronto University," said Dr. J. B. Campbell to The Advertiser when questioned as to his opinion of the move proposed by a journal of the medical association to lessen the powers of the council. "Men who practice medicine and who represent the different divisions of the province are more capable to look after the interests of the profession and of the general public than a few, self-interested professors in Toronto University who never practice medicine themselves. The only way to know what the profession needs, and what the people need from the profession is to actively work in the profession."

"The universities that have ceased to teach medicine should certainly have their representation cut off," Dr. Campbell added. "The universities that have ceased to teach medicine should certainly have their representation cut off."

"The move is a right one," he replied. "They have only been represented as a matter of courtesy for so long. No one ever thinks of being a homeopathist now. The science of homeopathy died with the founder."

OVERDRAFT IS ABOUT \$3,800

Victoria Hospital Accounts Show a Balance on the Wrong Side.

SCARLET FEVER BLAMED

Epidemic Last Year Occasioned Much Additional Expenditure on the Part of the Trust.

The hospital trust finished 1910 with an overdraft amounting to approximately \$3,800. The financial statement is now being prepared, and will be ready shortly. Sufficient is known, however, to point out that the trust needed \$3,800 more than was estimated to manage the hospital.

This would run the total the city had to pay for this institution up to \$42,300, or practically two mills on the dollar. It will readily be seen that the hospital this year will cost at least \$40,000.

The overdraft, it is said, was due to the fact that there was an epidemic of scarlet fever. When the estimates were brought down last year, it was thought that the epidemic was about over, and provision was not made, so the trustees claim, to meet the unusual and rather heavy expenditure attendant upon so serious an outbreak.

TWO-EDGED SWORD SAYS MR. GILLEN

G. T. R. Official Discusses the Talk of Discriminating Against Company.

LONDON WILL GET DEPOT

But the City Has Had Its Chance and Must Now Wait Until the Toronto Works Are Completed.

Superintendent U. E. Gillen, of the Grand Trunk, arrived in the city at noon today from Sarnia, and when seen by The Advertiser regarding the charges that have been made concerning the station being in an insanitary condition, said that as far as the company is concerned it is their most earnest desire to keep it as clean and sanitary as possible.

"Of course we cannot help it if, as occasionally happens, people will leave a lavatory in a disgraceful condition, but it does not stay that way any longer than we can help," he said. "We want to do what is right."

"The company knows just as well as London people do," continued Mr. Gillen, "that London needs a new station, and when the time comes it will be built. We want to make a clean sweep of the work that is to be done here when we start. We cannot touch any work in London until we get through the improvements in Toronto, where we are spending about \$500,000."

London Had Its Chance.

"London people," said Mr. Gillen, "had their chance, and if they had accepted it the work would have all been done by this time. Now they must wait, but improvements will come in time."

Mr. Gillen was told that there was some talk of shippers discriminating against the Grand Trunk, as they felt that with the business the company are doing here they should provide better accommodation.

"That would be a poor policy," said Mr. Gillen. "People should always remember that a sword cuts both ways. London has been good to the Grand Trunk, but on the other hand the G. T. R. pays out more in wages in London than any manufacturers in the city, and we help London in many other ways. It is always easy enough to criticize a company. We want to do what is right, and when the time comes, and we can get at it we will have lots of work to do in London."

WIRE NAIL CO. WILL HAVE A \$250,000 PLANT

Company Will Greatly Enlarge Its Works in This City.

DIRECTORS HAVE DECIDED MATTER

Company Has Secured Temporary Quarters on York St. Along the G. T. R.

Negotiations are under way by which the Wire Nail Manufacturing Company are planning the Western Wire and Nail Company will be moved out of their present factory on Ridout street. They have already purchased the old Waggoner Lumber factory on York street, at the corner of College, and are moving into it temporarily.

A Big Plant.

"We will build a new factory that with the machinery will cost fully \$250,000," said a gentleman in close touch with the matter to The Advertiser this afternoon. "The directors met here a couple of days ago and looked over a site for a new plant in the East End. A couple of other sites are being surveyed, and a selection will be made as soon as possible."

"The new factory will be very extensive, and one of the largest of its kind in America. The work will be rushed as soon as a site can be decided upon. The Waggoner Lumber Company's factory will only be used as temporary headquarters, so that the work of making the big improvements to the Wire Nail Manufacturing plant can be kept on with."

Most Important.

This announcement is one of the most important that has been made for some time. It is practically certain that the new plant will be located some place in the East End, and a large site will be needed.

LONDON STREET RAILWAY BEGINS WORK ON MONDAY

Will Rush Their Share of the Pavements on the Main Streets.

The London street railway will start on the reconstruction of the Dundas street pavement on Monday. On Saturday the turnouts will be put in position, and on Sunday the work will be started to go ahead with their construction. The north side of Dundas will be finished, and then the Richmond street section will be built. In a month's time a considerable portion of it will be completed.
