troducing the lessons was very detrimental, 3. Variety of matter and form of presentation was essential. Mechanical routine made sessions monotenous and tiresome. 4. Have short and earnest prayers. Long devotions tired young children, 5. Superintend-ents should drop their sermonettes and instill some important truth in the minds of the students.

Should Have Committee. Rev. W. A. Brown considered that every Sunday school should have a missionary committee, which would have for its duties four things, viz.: . Promote missionary instructions in the Sunday schools. The children should learn the value of missions, and be taught the lives of great mis-sionaries. 
