

S. S. ASSOCIATION ELECTS R. J. WATSON ITS 1913 PRESIDENT

Rev. E. W. Halpenny Gives
Instructions How to Make
Teaching Effective.

Appeal Made by Rev. W. A.
Brown on Behalf of Mis-
sionary Work.

The officers of the London Sunday
School Association for the year 1913
were elected prior to the opening
last night.

R. J. Watson was selected as president, and Mr. J. K. H. Pope as vice-president. The other officers are: Corresponding secretary and treasurer, Mr. E. E. Reid; recording secretary, Mr. G. M. Miller; superintendent of the Adult Bible classes, Mr. I. Taylor; superintendent of secondary grades, A. J. Omond; superintendent of elementary work, Miss H. Little; superintendent of teacher training, Miss M. Trebilcock; superintendent of temperance, Mr. J. B. Campbell; superintendent of missionary department, Rev. G. A. McKenzie; and superintendent of home department, J. H. W. McRoberts.

At 6:30 o'clock a superintendents' tea was given in Wesley Hall and was attended by 35 of the officials.

Evening Session.
The evening session of the Sunday school conference was even better attended than in the afternoon, and equally interesting and instructive for the Sunday school workers.

Rev. E. W. Halpenny in his address entitled "Getting the Most Out of a Session," stated that worship, study and business were the three essential elements of every Sunday school session. He placed emphasis on the study period and considered that half the time should be placed on it. He passed out many practical hints which would make teaching more effective. Some were as follows: 1. The superintendent should see that prior to the commencement that proper conditions for study should prevail in the classroom in-
troducing the lessons was very detrimental. 3. Variety of matter and form of presentation was essential. 4. Mechanical routine made sessions monotonous and tiresome. 5. Have short and earnest prayers. Long devotions tired young children. 6. Superintendents should drop their sermons and instill some important truth in the minds of the students.

Should Have Committee.
Rev. W. A. Brown considered that every Sunday school should have a missionary committee, which would have for its duties four things, viz: 1. Promote missionary instructions in the Sunday schools. The children should learn the value of missions, and he taught the lives of great missionaries. He knew of people today who quoted St. Paul and St. John, but who were really friends of Judas when it came to giving to missions. 2. Missionary prayers should be taught in the school. 3. Every child should be taught systematic missionary giving, and a weekly offering should be contributed. 4. The committee should be continually on the outlook for suitable candidates to send to the mission field.

Plea for Foreigners.
Mr. Brown asked for a more lenient view to be taken of the foreigner in Canada. He wanted them to be termed "Future Canadians," and not foreigners.

Mr. E. E. Reid, the representative to the Ontario Association, reported that the methods of some of the London Sunday schools were very unbusinesslike. He said that great difficulty had been experienced in securing the reports from some schools, and criticized the superintendents for a great part of the laxity in this regard. Only one-third of the reports had been obtained.

Mr. Israel Taylor spoke along similar lines. He stated that he had been enthusiastic over their Sunday schools when preparing for the convention, but was a little surprised at Mr. Halpenny's report.

Mr. J. W. H. McRoberts reported that very little had been accomplished in the home department, but the future outlook was bright.

VEGETABLE GROWERS HEARD FINE ADDRESSES

Practical Lettuce and Salsify
Growing Discussed by Leading
Local Experts.

The regular meeting of the London Branch of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association, held in the County Buildings, was well attended.

The president, Mr. G. W. Bycroft, being late in attending, the chair was taken by Mr. J. J. Davis, of Byron, doing the first part of the program.

This consisted of three very able addresses, first, by Mr. Leslie Elmslie, a representative of the Potato Syndicate, followed by Mr. N. Sanderson, of Byron, and Mr. Thomas Hill, on the growing of "Lettuce" and "Salsify" respectively.

Mr. Elmslie illustrated his address by lantern slides, showing the mines where the different fertilizers are excavated in the craters of the immense factories where they are refined, and the ponderous machinery used in the development.

Mr. N. Sanderson, of Byron, one of the largest and most successful greenhouse men in the vicinity of London, addressed the growers on the methods he employed, which brought success to him in the line of growing lettuce. The points he brought out were noted by those in attendance, and will be put into practice by them.

Mr. Thomas Hill followed with an interesting and unique account of his methods of growing salsify.

Mr. Bycroft then took the chair, and proceeded with the business part of the program.

Mr. C. W. Baker, appointed at the recent convention in Toronto to the post of president of the Provincial Vegetable Growers' Association, and Mr. R. D. Duggan, delegate to that convention from the London branch, gave reports of the proceedings of the meeting in Toronto.

SMART JOCKEYING OVER WOMEN'S VOTE BILL

An Interesting Situation Has
Developed in the
Legislature.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—An interesting situation presents itself to the House over the jockeying for position in introducing legislation to give married women who hold property the municipal franchise. Last week two bills were placed on the order paper by Mr. P. G. Macdormid (West Elgin), to give women the vote, but they should only have stood as notices of motion. On Thursday, Mr. J. C. Elliott (West Middlesex), gave notice of the necessary bills, and they were introduced yesterday.

In the absence of Mr. Macdormid yesterday, again introduced the necessary bills to carry out Mr. Macdormid's object, and Mr. Elliott pointed out that the time required under the notice had not elapsed, and at Sir James Whitney's suggestion they stand for the Speaker's ruling until today.

The method of affecting this legislation is somewhat involved. Under the municipal act the qualifications of a voter in municipal elections are defined, and the assessment and voters' lists acts are only methods of carrying out the act, seeing that the lists are properly prepared. Mr. Elliott's amendment strikes out the words in the municipal act, "Male, widow and spinster," which removes the disability on married women, and puts married women on a par with single women in exactly the same position as unmarried women and widows. It further provides that where the property owned or occupied by married women is of sufficient value, if equally divided between a married woman and her husband, to give both a vote, both may vote, but if it is not of sufficient value, then the married woman has the vote. This is practically carrying out the principle now in operation with regard to voting for school trustees or boards of education.

Under the proposed Macdormid bill the husband is assessed as the owner of the property, and she has to give notice to the assessor or the court of revision, with the result that only those who give this notice will be entitled to vote at municipal elections.

Mr. Elliott's amendment does not touch the question of a husband qualifying for municipal office on his wife's property, and the law in this respect, if the bill carried, will remain as it is.

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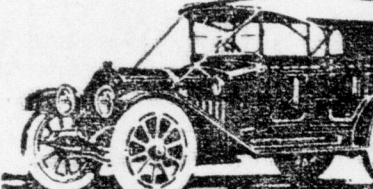
