**Death of Husband****Cause Fatal Shock**

Mrs. Anne Lewis, One of City's Oldest Citizens, Passed Away.

Death claimed another of London's oldest citizens Sunday night in the person of Mrs. Anne Lewis, of 174 Mill street, widow of the late John Lewis, in her 85th year.

Her husband's death occurred five weeks previous, and the shock to Mrs. Lewis, who was in a weakened condition when he died, proved too much.

Mrs. Lewis was born in Connaught, Ireland, and came to this city 75 years ago, where she had resided ever since. She is survived by one brother, Peter Carling, of Hamilton; four daughters, Mrs. R. Walsh, Mrs. James Dewar, and Miss Annie, of this city, and Mrs. D. C. Roche, of Chicago, and four sons, T. F., P. C., and J. P., of this city, and P. E. of Vancouver.

The funeral, which will be private, will be held from the family residence Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock to St. Peter's Cathedral, where requiem high mass will be celebrated. Interment will take place in St. Peter's Cemetery.

**Sacred Heart Not****Leaving Forest City**

Report That Institution Is Going to Toronto Without Foundation.

There is no truth in the statement published in the Toronto papers to the effect that the Sisters of the Sacred Heart have received instructions to close the convent here. Rumor has been busy for many years regarding this educational institution, although there has been little ground for believing that the convent would be moved. In conversation with The Advertiser this morning the mother superior said that there was nothing being done to give credence to the report that appeared, and that such things are injurious to the convent. For nearly ten years these statements have appeared at regular intervals.

Rev. Dr. Elliott, of This City, on Way Home From Inland China.

Word has been received by Mrs. J. H. Elliott, of 556 Ridout street, that her son, Rev. C. C. Elliott, M.D., who is a missionary in China, and who, with his wife and family, is now in England, will be home for a visit this fall.

Dr. Elliott spent many years in China, and during the rebellion there a year ago was the only missionary to stay at his station, all the rest being ordered away by the Government. He refused to go, however, and stayed with his work throughout the fighting. Mr. Elliott is connected with the inland missions under the Episcopal Church.
