SAYS BOOKS ARE OPEN
TO PUBLIC INSPECTION

Chairman of Public Utilities
Commission Declares People
Can See Pay Sheets.

Chairman Philip Pocock, of the pub-
lic utilities commission, said today in
answer to the criticism made upon the
commission's work at the trades and
labor council last night, that the books
of the commission were open for in-
spection.

In reply to the statement that all the
official help of the hydro-electric in Lon-
don were getting good pay, while the
men who did the work drew only \$8
and \$9 a week, Mr. Pocock said, "Our
pay sheets are open to the public, and
so far as I know all our men are get-
ting good wages. The linemen asked
for an increase of pay recently, and
the matter has been referred to the
municipal public commission, and the
different electrical engineers will un-
doubtedly work out a scale of wages.
That is the prime reason why the mat-
ter has been referred."

JOINT MEMORIAL SERVICE
FOR LATE ED. BEALE

Y. M. C. A. and Adelaide Street
**Baptist Church Will Co-
Operate.**

There will be a joint memorial ser-
vice of the Y. M. C. A. and the Adelaide
Street Baptist Church on Sunday morn-
ing in the Adelaide Street Baptist
Church to the memory of Edward Beale,
the young manager of Davies' East End
store, who was killed by the express
of Ireland with 21 other Londoners.
Mr. Beale was an enthusiastic worker
in the Y. M. C. A., and also in the
Adelaide Street Church, and both or-
ganizations feel his loss keenly. Speak-
ers, representing both church and as-
sociation, will participate in the service,
while former classmates of the lost
Londoner will also speak.

Lochalsh Woman Badly Shaken, and One

Has Collar Bone Broken.

Lucknow, June 4.—Mrs. Alex. MacKen-

alsh, were victims of a somewhat serious
accident yesterday afternoon, when on

posite Stewart Robertson's farm, one of
the lines dropped from the driver's hand.
The horse then took to circling around in
the road, and soon buggy and ladies were
upset in the ditch. The ladies were both
badly shaken up, especially Mrs. MacLennan,
whose collarbone was broken.
They were assisted to Alex. MacLennan's
midst, and medical aid sent for at once.
Both are progressing favorably.

ASK RENEWAL OF
COUNTY'S GRANT

County Agricultural Deputation
Wants Continuance of
Aid.

GILES BRIDGE ONCE MORE

Famous Question Brought Up
Again by Deputation's
Visit.

The even tenor of the county council
was not disturbed yesterday after-
noon, the session passing off peace-
fully and quietly, routine business
being the order of the afternoon.

A deputation from the County Agri-
cultural Association asked for a con-
tinuance of its grant and asked for
an increase. Their request was re-
ferred to the finance committee.

Another deputation was present
from Caradoc, to urge the claims of
the famous Giles site for a new bridge,
but as the council has decided to re-
build the Tait bridge nearby the de-
putation decided not to press their claim.

Refer Grant to Committee.

The motion made by Wm. Sullivan,
seconded by S. Oakes, that the Strath-
roy Hospital receive a grant of \$500,
was referred to the finance committee.

An account for \$91, and one for
\$157.50, from the Byron Sanatorium,
for the maintenance of county patients
in that institution, was referred to the
finance committee.

A communication from G. A. Ram-
say, R.R., No. 5, asking that the county
look into the matter of oiling roads
used by autos, in conjunction
with the Government Good Roads
Commission and the various motor
leagues, was referred to the board
of road directors.

A petition was received from a num-
ber of North Dorchester residents who
wish to have Dorchester village con-
stituted a police village. The matter
referred to the petitioning com-
mittee.

Maintain Rest Room.

A motion was made by John V.
Loughton, seconded by John Morgan,
that the council grant \$100 yearly to
Parkhill if it would maintain a rest
room for the citizens in its new
Carnegie library.

J. A. McIntyre moved and J. J.
Pocock seconded a motion, that the
county grant \$100 towards gravel-
ling a road between Middlesex and Huron
County, providing Huron granted the
same amount.

Moved by Frank Boyes, seconded
by A. H. Banks, that the county grant
\$100 for gravel on the town line be-
tween Dereham and North Dorchester,
providing the county of Oxford grant
an equal amount.

F. Barret and Walter Bolton moved
that the county share in the assets of
West Williams, to be used in gravel-
ling county roads.

J. W. Laidlaw and J. H. Mair moved
that an overdraft of \$1,000 be allowed
for improving the town line between
Dorchester and Westminster, and that
\$2,500 be expended on the rebuilding
of the road.

The above and other resolutions for
graveling various county roads were
made and referred to the road com-
mittee.

Discuss Patients' Admission.

The report of the committee ap-
pointed to confer with the authorities
of St. Joseph Hospital re the admis-
sion of county patients was adopted.
Patients will be admitted to the hos-
pital on an order signed by the reeve
and deputy reeve of the patient's
municipality.

A number of accounts passed by the
finance committee were adopted.
Auditors Stanley and Jewell, of the
county and city respectively, reported
that the county share in the asset of
the newly annexed districts around
London amounted to \$1,113.82. The
city assumes a net liability for
\$6,888.35, which, with the liability as-
sumed by the Dominion Abattoir dis-
trict, totals \$7,123.35. The total amount
payable to the county is fixed at
\$7,100. This report was adopted.

The council then adjourned till 10
o'clock this morning.

MOTHER AND DAUGHTER
DIE IN MOTOR ACCIDENT

Father and Son Injured When
Montreal Street Car
Strikes Auto.

[Canadian Press.]

MONTREAL, June 3.—A street car
smashed into an automobile owned by
Emile Robillard, 225 Hamilton street, at
the intersection of Atwater avenue and
St. Antoine street this evening at 6:30,
with fatal results.

Mrs. Robillard, 40 years of age, and a
daughter, Miss E. Robillard, were in-
stantly killed.

Mr. Robillard and a son, Eugene, were
seriously hurt, and are now in the West-
ern Hospital. They are suffering from
broken ribs, general contusions, cuts and
probably internal injuries. The motor
man of the car, Roscoe Chennevert, 522
St. Antoine street, escaped with his left
arm crushed.

The street car had descended a some-
what stiff grade on Atwater avenue, and
was just swinging onto St. Antoine street,
when it left the track. The automobile,
with its four occupants, was proceeding
along St. Antoine street, at this critical
moment, and the car plunged into it at
terrific speed. The automobile was
jammed against the curb and the Robil-
lard family were thrown out.

The mother and daughter were not so
fortunate as the father and son, and were
not thrown clear of the car or auto. Mrs.
Robillard was caught beneath the auto-
mobile. It is thought her skull was
crushed, as there were few marks on her,
except a wound in the back of the head.
Miss Robillard became pinned under the
street car and was badly crushed. It was
with some difficulty that her body was
extricated.

AVIATOR MACAULAY FALLS

Is Hurt—Machine Almost

Wrecked.

BEETON, June 3.—MacAulay, the
aviator, sustained a serious accident
while giving an exhibition here today.
The engine of his aeroplane gave out
while he was sixty feet in the air and
the machine and man fell to the
ground. MacAulay was picked up
with a broken leg and one of his
arms and back hurt. The aeroplane
was almost completely wrecked.
