EXPLORER'S SHIP WENT ASHORE IN THE STRAITS

Crocker Land Expedition on the Sealer Diana Is 400 Miles From Help.

[Canadian Press.]

St. Johns, Nfld., July 17.—The sealer Diana, conveying McMillan's Crocker Land expedition northward, went ashore last night in a dense fog at Barge Point, forty miles west of Battle Harbor, Bette Isle Straits, and is likely to be a total wreck. The ship is so firmly aground, according to latest reports, that it is unlikely she will ever be refloated. The Newfoundland Government cruiser Stella Maris has been ordered to her aid.

It is not believed here that she can pull off the Diana, which is completely loaded with coal and supplies. Everybody aboard the Diana is safe and well.

The Stella Maris will have to steam more than 400 miles from this port to reach the disabled vessel. Barge Point, where the accident occurred, is on the extreme southern portion of the Labrador coast, and is about 50 miles east of the boundary line separating Labrador from Quebec Province. There is no large settlement in the vicinity.

The Diana sailed from Boston after taking on a quantity of food and medical supplies on July 5, and after a stop at Sydney, N. S., sailed north on July 12. The expedition was sent out by the American Geographical Society and the American Museum of Natural History of New York. The explorers are under command of Donald B. McMillan. They planned to remain three years in Crocker Land.

BOY OF NINE UNDER ARREST

May Be Charged With Murdering Little Girl of Two.

PLANNED A ROBBERY

Winnipeg, July 17.—One of the most extraordinary cases which has yet come before the provincial police was the one today which may result in a charge of murder being preferred against Anton Sawchuk, a 9-year-old child, who is alleged to have murdered Annie Lutz, aged 2½ years, on a farm at Tyndal on Monday. At an inquest last night at Tyndal the verdict was an open one and the boy was brought to the city today.

As far as can be learned the boy planned to rob the house of the Lutzs. He is supposed to have entered the house when only Annie was there and to have deliberately shot her. The boy is also alleged to have planned to murder the whole family.
