RUSSIANS REALIZE THE GERMAN PLOT

Great Battle at Niemen Just Demonstration to Draw Troops.

But the Plan Failed

Bad Condition of the Roads Interfered—Rulers Both Near Craacow.

[Canadian Press.] Petrograd, Sunday, Oct. 4.—Via London, Oct. 5.—2:30 p.m.—In Russian military circles it is felt that the Russian general staff is now able to analyze and will be able to forestall the intended German invasion of Russia.

The city revealed by the present fighting near Warsaw, was an attempt to take Warsaw, and thence move to the southwest to outflank the Russian army which had occupied Galicia.

Rulers Both There. The reported presence of Emperor William in East Prussia, and the departure of Emperor Nicholas for the front is taken here as evidence of the tremendous importance of the impending battle, which may be the biggest conflict of the war, up to the present time.
