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FEARS HULL MAY
BECOME BARROOM
OF DRY ONTARIO

Mayor Cosineau Calls Special Meeting of Council To Discuss Problem.

OTTAWA, April 19.—In view of the "bone-dry prohibition" vote in Ontario, and the possibility that Hull might be converted into the barroom of Ontario, Mayor Cosineau will urge the council to move for the abolition of the sale of liquor in Hull.

A special meeting of the council will be held tomorrow night, and a petition will be submitted praying the Quebec License Commission to refrain from establishing a retail liquor vendor's store in Hull, according to a news story in the Journal this afternoon. If liquor is for sale in Hull, following the proclamation in Ontario conditions will be terrible, Mayor Cosineau contends. The city will be converted into a great drinking area, as people would flock to the city from different parts of the country.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT
APPROVE POLICY OF
MILITARY GOVERNORS

Austen Chamberlain States in Answer to Question in the House.

LONDON, April 19.—The British Government approves fully the general policy of the military governors in Ireland, it was declared in the House of Commons today by Austen Chamberlain, the Government leader. Asked whether a policy existed of official reprisals by the crown forces in Ireland, Mr. Chamberlain replied: "It is within the discretion of the military governors in the martial law area to direct the carrying out of punishment on the districts in which outrages have been committed. The imposition and collection of fines is a legitimate and recognized feature of martial law, but as far as my information goes the occasions on which such fines are imposed are very few. The general policy pursued by the military governors of Ireland has the full approval of the Government."

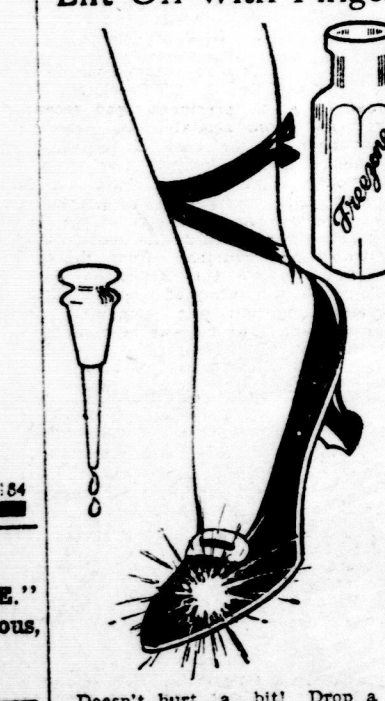

CHARLES TO STAY
IN SWITZERLAND

Government, It Is Understood, Will Permit the Ex-Emperor To Remain in Republic.

GENEVA, April 19.—Former King Charles wishes to remain in Switzerland, and I understand the Swiss Government will agree to this, it was reported today. Charles did not care on monarchial plotting in Switzerland it was not to establish a king in the Swiss Republic, but in Hungary, and if a section of the Hungarian people living at Prague, this concerns Hungary and not Switzerland.

Meantime, Frangins Castle is being evacuated by Charles' household and suite, numbering over 100 persons, including priests, flunkies, footmen, governesses, chauffeurs, etc., and the local butcher, baker and candlestick maker, who thrives upon the ex-emperor's household, are as yet at the prospect of losing such an excellent customer, and are actually making efforts to induce the local authorities to allow Charles to continue living at Frangins. The Lucerne people think that to have Charles' family and suite there might give advertisement to Lucerne and bring a little grist to their almost empty mills. Moreover, as 1,000,000 American tourists are expected in Europe this spring and summer, the Lucerne people hope that many will be attracted to Lucerne to catch a glimpse of the monarch in exile.

Frangins Castle once belonged to Prince Jerome Napoleon, son of Jerome Bonaparte, King of Westphalia, and was inhabited by Joseph Napoleon when in exile. In 1892, he was the resort of the Napoleon family generally, and former King Charles' attempt to regain his throne was not the only such attempt planned from Frangins. Thus Prince Jerome Napoleon, 1878, retired from Frangins with Napoleon III, then in exile at Chislehurst, England, to go to France to regain his throne, but two days before Napoleon was to have departed he died of a heart attack. Frangins, therefore, has not spelled happiness to ex-royalties connected with it.

NEW YORK ENGINEER TESTIFIES. TORONTO, April 19.—E. F. Wood, head of a firm of engineers, New York, testifying here today before the Government commission inquiring into the projected radial railways of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, estimated that the proposed Toronto and Eastern Railway in 1925 would do an interurban traffic of 880,750 rides, yielding a revenue of \$4,571,712. He based his estimate upon a population of 31,208 along the route from York Township to Bowmanville.

Mr. Wood estimated that the operating expenses for 1925 on the Ontario and Eastern Railway would amount to \$938,237, or 22-1/2c per car mile.

KING OF LITTLE ITALY DEAD. TORONTO, April 19.—Antonio Corcaso, 501 St. James street, the most prominent Italian labor contractor in Canada, died this morning.

He was born in San Donato, Ninea, Province of Cosenza, Italy, on June 15, 1862. He came here 35 years ago, and was among the first Italian settlers in Montreal. He financed the immigration of tens of thousands of Italians to Canada to work on railway construction. In 1902 he was presented by the Italians in Canada with a crown symbolizing "King of Little Italy." Later he has conducted a shipping agency and banking business with international affiliations.

RETURNED BY MAIL

Federal Government Adopts New System On Grounds of Economy.

HOSPITAL AID TAG DAY

ST. THOMAS, April 19.—A new feature in the conducting of Federal elections is the delivering by deputy returning officers of the ballot boxes by mail. Over 40 boxes came through the local postoffice today, and all were treated as registered matter. This innovation in the election proceedings has been introduced as an item of economy to save the Government the cost of mileage allowed the officers where returning the boxes after the returns are completed. That there were so large a staff provided to take care of the vote was due to the directions of the election act, which provided that the number of votes permitted to be taken at each station must not exceed 250. The limiting of the number of elections that figure is done to prevent overcrowding of the polling station and allow every vote on the list to be polled.

TO NEW OFFICES AT
CHATHAM—BANQUET

New Plant Said to Be Last Word in Equipment.

CHATHAM, April 19.—An interesting ceremony took place this afternoon at 4 o'clock when the local branch of the Bell Telephone Company switched over from their old local plant to their new plant valued at \$250,000. The structure in which the equipment is housed is situated in the new building, and the entire system of the company, and no expense has been spared to make it the best branch office in the province.

Stratton, after which the operators commenced work. The total staff numbers about 70. Financial Statement Shows Total Revenue of \$8,021—Balance Is \$402.

ST. THOMAS, April 19.—The condition of the finances and growth of the congregation of Trinity Anglican Church was very much in evidence tonight at the adjourned vestry meeting. Every department of the church shows a credit cash balance, and the Sunday school to be flourishing and financially prosperous. The wardens start the new church year with practically no liabilities. The rector, Rev. J. W. J. Andrew, presided.

The financial report of the year shows the revenue to have been \$8,021, the principal source being \$5,314 from en-

velope collections. The cash subscriptions were \$1,094. The disbursements were \$7,618, and the balance in the bank is \$402.

Church Societies. The Ladies' Aid expended \$479 and has a balance of hand of \$151. The Ladies' Guild disbursed \$1,007, and has a balance to the good of \$374, about the same as a year ago. The Sunday school had a revenue of \$750.
